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In April 2015 Public Sector Audit Appointments Ltd (PSAA) issued ‘Statement of responsibilities of auditors and audited bodies 2015-16’. It is available from the Chief Executive of each audited body and via the PSAA website (www.psaa.co.uk)

1. Executive summary

The National Audit Office's Code of Audit Practice (the Code) requires us to report to those charged with governance on the work we have carried out to discharge our statutory audit responsibilities together with any governance issues identified. We regard Oxfordshire County Council's Audit Committee as the member forum ultimately responsible for the governance of the Oxfordshire Pension Fund, however we also report our findings to the Pensions Committee ahead of the Audit Committee meeting.

This report summarises the findings from the 2015/16 audit which is substantially complete. It includes messages arising from our audit of the Pension Fund's financial statements.

Below are the results and conclusions on the significant areas of the audit process.

Status of the audit	<p>We have substantially completed our audit of the financial statements of Oxfordshire Pension Fund for the year ended 2015/16. Subject to satisfactory completion of the outstanding items included in Appendix A we will issue an audit opinion in the form which appears in Appendix D.</p> <p>We have performed the procedures outlined in our Audit Plan and anticipate issuing an unqualified opinion on the Pension Fund's financial statements. We also expect to conclude that the Pension Fund's annual report is consistent with the financial statements.</p>
Audit differences	<p>There are no unadjusted audit differences.</p> <p>Our audit identified a small number of disclosure errors which were highlighted to management for amendment. We do not consider any of these significant and therefore we have not provided further detail of these amendments.</p>
Scope and materiality	<p>In our audit plan presented at the 13 July 2016 Audit Committee meeting, we communicated that our audit procedures would be performed using a materiality of £18.4 million. We have reassessed this based on the actual results for the financial year and there has been no change to the materiality level we have applied. Our materiality is based on 1% of the Fund's net assets which were £1.842 billion in the draft financial statements.</p> <p>The threshold for reporting audit differences which impact the financial statements has not changed from £0.92 million.</p> <p>We carried out our work in accordance with our Audit Plan.</p>
Significant audit risks	<p>We identified the following audit risk during the planning phase of our audit, and reported this to you in our audit plan:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Risk of management override. <p>The 'addressing audit risks' section of this report sets out how we have gained audit assurance over this issue.</p>
Other reporting issues	<p>We have no other matters we wish to report.</p>

2. Responsibilities and purpose of our work

The Council's responsibilities

Oxfordshire County Council as the administering authority of the Pension Fund is responsible for preparing and publishing its Statement of Accounts which includes the financial statements of the Pension Fund.

The Council is also required to prepare a separate Annual Report and Statement of Accounts for the Pension Fund.

Purpose of our work

Our audit was designed to:

- Express an opinion on the 2015/16 financial statements of the Pension Fund;
- Report on whether information in the Annual Report is consistent with the financial statements.

In addition, this report contains our findings related to the areas of audit emphasis and any views on significant deficiencies in internal control or the Pension Fund's accounting policies and key judgments.

3. Financial statements audit

Addressing audit risks

We identified the following audit risks during the planning phase of our audit, and reported these in our Audit Plan. Here, we set out how we have gained audit assurance over those issues.

A significant audit risk in the context of the audit of the financial statements is an inherent risk with both a higher likelihood of occurrence and a higher magnitude of effect should it occur and which requires special audit consideration. For significant risks, we obtain an understanding of the entity's controls relevant to each risk and assess the design and implementation of the relevant controls.

With any change of systems, there is a risk that errors can occur.</p> <p>In particular we note that the Fund has not been supplied with timely accurate and complete data relating to starters, leaver and changes to members' status.</p>	<p>Reviewed the year end annual reconciliation of members' data.</p> <p>Developed a testing strategy to test completeness of contributions and benefits payable based on the results of the reconciliation.</p>	<p>We understand that the backlog which built up on queries on individual members' records have now been cleared for 2015/16.</p> <p>We developed our testing strategy for contributions based on analytical review, testing of contribution rates, and the fund's monitoring of contributions received. No issues were noted in our testing.</p> <p>Our testing strategy for benefits payable included analytical review, detailed testing of lump sums and a review of large or unusual expenses. No issues were noted in our testing.</p>

Other matters

As required by ISA (UK&I) 260 and other ISAs specifying communication requirements, we are required to communicate to you significant findings from the audit and other matters that are significant to the oversight of the Pension Fund's financial reporting process, including the following:

- Qualitative aspects of the Fund's accounting practices; estimates and disclosures;
- Matters specifically required by other auditing standards to be communicated to those charged with governance. For example, issues about fraud, compliance with laws and regulations, external confirmations and related party transactions;
- Any significant difficulties encountered during the audit; and
- Other audit matters of governance interest.

We have no matters we wish to report.

Control themes and observations

It is the responsibility of the Council to develop and implement systems of internal financial control for the Pension Fund and to put in place proper arrangements to monitor their adequacy and effectiveness in practice. Our responsibility as auditor is to consider whether the Council has put adequate arrangements in place to satisfy itself that the Pension Fund's systems of internal financial control are both adequate and effective in practice.

We have tested the controls of the Pension Fund only to the extent necessary for us to complete our audit. We are not expressing an opinion on the overall effectiveness of internal control.

We have not identified any significant deficiencies in the design or operation of an internal control that might result in a material misstatement in your financial statements of which you are not aware.

We have noted that the Fund was not able to issue all Annual Benefits Statements to individual members as required by 31 August 2016 and has reported this to the Pensions Regulator. This is due to issues in receiving monthly data returns (MARS) from all scheme employers, which record changes in respect of individual employees. This has affected the returns from County Council as a result of the transfer to IBC referred to above, but a number of other employers have also experienced problems. This has caused the Fund's administration team significant additional work to resolve these issues.

Request for written representations

We have requested a management representation letter to gain management's confirmation in relation to a number of matters, as outlined in Appendix E. We are not requesting any specific representations over and above the standard ones.

Independent auditor’s report to the members of Oxfordshire County Council

Opinion on the pension fund financial statements

We have audited the pension fund financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2016 under the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014. The pension fund financial statements comprise the Fund Account, the Net Assets Statement, the Statement of Accounting Policies and the related notes 1 to 29. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2015/16.

This report is made solely to the members of Oxfordshire County Council in accordance with Part 5 of the Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014 and for no other purpose, as set out in paragraph 43 of the Statement of Responsibilities of Auditors and Audited Bodies published by Public Sector Audit Appointments Limited. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the authority and the authority’s members as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of the Chief Finance Officer and auditor

As explained more fully in the Statement of the Chief Finance Officer’s Responsibilities set out on page x, the Chief Finance Officer is responsible for the preparation of the Authority’s Statement of Accounts, which includes the pension fund financial statements, in accordance with proper practices as set out in the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2015/16, and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view. Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board’s Ethical Standards for Auditors.

Scope of the audit of the financial statements

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the fund’s circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the Chief Finance Officer and the overall presentation of the financial statements. In addition, we read all the financial and non-financial information in the Statement of Accounts 2015/16 to identify material inconsistencies with the audited financial statements and to identify any information that is apparently materially incorrect based on, or materially inconsistent with, the knowledge acquired by us in the course of performing the audit. If we become aware of any apparent material misstatements or inconsistencies we consider the implications for our report.

Opinion on financial statements

In our opinion the pension fund financial statements:

- give a true and fair view of the financial transactions of the pension fund during the year ended 31 March 2016 and the amount and disposition of the fund’s assets and liabilities as at 31 March 2016; and
- have been properly prepared in accordance with the CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2015/16.

Opinion on other matters

In our opinion, the information given in the Statement of Accounts 2015/16 for the financial year for which the financial statements are prepared is consistent with the financial statements.

Appendix E – Management representation letter

To be prepared on the Council's letterhead and addressed to Ernst & Young

1. This representation letter is provided in connection with your audit of the financial statements of Oxfordshire County Council Pension Fund ("the Pension Fund") for the year ended 31 March 2016. We recognise that obtaining representations from us concerning the information contained in this letter is a significant procedure in enabling you to form an opinion as to whether the financial statements show a true and fair view of the financial transactions of the Pension Fund during the year ended 31 March 2016, and of the amount and disposition at the end of the year of its assets and liabilities, in accordance with applicable law and CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2015/16.
2. We understand that the purpose of your audit of the Pension Fund's financial statements is to express an opinion thereon and that your audit was conducted in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland), which involves an examination of the accounting system, internal control and related data to the extent you considered necessary in the circumstances, and is not designed to identify - nor necessarily be expected to disclose – all fraud, shortages, errors and other irregularities, should any exist.
3. Accordingly, we make the following representations, which are true to the best of our knowledge and belief, having made such inquiries as we considered necessary for the purpose of appropriately informing ourselves:

A. Financial Statements and Financial Records

1. We have fulfilled our responsibilities for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 and CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2015/16 and for keeping records in respect of contributions received in respect of active members of the Pension Fund and for making accurate representations to you.
2. We confirm that the Pension Fund is a Registered Pension Fund. We are not aware of any reason why the tax status of the Pension Fund should change.
3. We acknowledge our responsibility for the fair presentation of the financial statements. We believe the financial statements referred to above show a true and fair view of the financial position and the financial performance of the Pension Fund in accordance with Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 and CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2015/16, and are free of material misstatements, including omissions. We have approved the financial statements.
4. The significant accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are appropriately described in the financial statements.
5. We believe that the Pension Fund has a system of internal controls adequate to enable the preparation of accurate financial statements in accordance with Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 and CIPFA/LASAAC Code of Practice on Local Authority Accounting in the United Kingdom 2015/16 that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.
6. There are no unadjusted audit differences identified during the current audit and pertaining to the latest period presented.

B. Fraud

1. We acknowledge that we are responsible for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal controls to prevent and detect fraud.
2. We have disclosed to you the results of our assessment of the risk that the financial statements may be materially misstated as a result of fraud.
3. We have no knowledge of any fraud or suspected fraud involving management or other employees who have a significant role in the Pension Fund's internal controls over financial reporting. In addition, we have no knowledge of any fraud or suspected fraud involving other employees in which the fraud could have a material effect on the financial statements. We have no knowledge of any allegations of financial improprieties, including fraud or suspected fraud, (regardless of the source or form and including without limitation, any allegations by "whistleblowers") which could result in a misstatement of the financial statements or otherwise affect the financial reporting of the Pension Fund.

C. Compliance with Laws and Regulations

1. We have disclosed to you all known actual or suspected noncompliance with laws and regulations whose effects should be considered when preparing the financial statements.
2. We have not made any reports to The Pensions Regulator, nor are we aware of any such reports having been made by any of our advisors.
3. There have been no other communications with The Pensions Regulator or other regulatory bodies during the Pension Fund year or subsequently concerning matters of non-compliance with any legal duty.

D. Information Provided and Completeness of Information and Transactions

1. We have provided you with:
 - Access to all information of which we are aware that is relevant to the preparation of the financial statements such as records, documentation and other matters as agreed in terms of the audit engagement.
 - Additional information that you have requested from us for the purpose of the audit.
 - Unrestricted access to persons within the entity from whom you determined it necessary to obtain audit evidence.
2. You have been informed of all changes to the Pension Fund rules.
3. All material transactions have been recorded in the accounting records and are reflected in the financial statements.
4. We have made available to you all minutes of the Pensions Committee (or summaries of actions of recent meetings for which minutes have not yet been prepared) held through the year to the most recent meeting on the following date 9 September 2016.
5. We confirm the completeness of information provided regarding the identification of related parties. We have disclosed to you the identity of the Pension Fund's related parties and all related parties and related party transactions of which we are aware, including sales, purchases, loans, transfers of assets, liabilities and services, leasing arrangements, guarantees, non-monetary transactions and transactions for no

consideration for the period ended, as well as related balances due to or from such parties at the year end. These transactions have been appropriately accounted for and disclosed in the financial statements.

6. We have disclosed to you, and the Pension Fund has complied with, all aspects of contractual agreements that could have a material effect on the financial statements in the event of non-compliance, including all covenants, conditions or other requirements of all outstanding debt.
7. No transactions have been made which are not in the interests of the Pension Fund members or the Pension Fund during the Scheme year or subsequently.

E. Liabilities and Contingencies

1. All liabilities and contingencies, including those associated with guarantees, whether written or oral, have been disclosed to you and are appropriately reflected in the financial statements.
2. We have informed you of all outstanding and possible litigation and claims, whether or not they have been discussed with legal counsel.
3. We have recorded and/or disclosed, as appropriate, all liabilities related litigation and claims, both actual and contingent, and confirm that we have given no guarantees to third parties.

F. Subsequent Events

1. There have been no events subsequent to the year-end which require adjustment of or disclosure in the financial statements or notes thereto.

G. Advisory Reports

1. We have not commissioned advisory reports which may affect the conduct of your work in relation to the Pension Fund's financial statements

H. Independence

1. We confirm that no-one charged with governance of the Scheme is connected with, or is an associate of, Ernst & Young LLP which would render Ernst & Young LLP ineligible to act as auditor to the Scheme.

I. Derivative Financial Instruments

1. We confirm that all investments in derivative financial instruments have been made after due consideration by the Pension Fund Committee of the limitations in their use imposed by The Occupational Pension Schemes (Investment) Regulations 2005; namely that they contribute to a reduction in scheme risk, facilitate efficient portfolio management, and that any such investment has been made so as to avoid excessive risk exposure to a single counterparty and to other derivative operations. The Pension Fund's statement of investment principles has been duly reviewed to ensure that such investments comply with any limitations imposed by its provisions.
2. The financial statements disclose all transactions in derivative financial instruments that have been entered into during the period, those still held by the Pension Fund at the scheme year end and the terms and conditions relating thereto.

3. We have duly considered and deemed as appropriate the assumptions and methodologies used in the valuation of 'over the counter' derivative financial instruments which the Pension Fund is holding, and these have been communicated to you.

J. Actuarial valuation

1. The latest report of the actuary (Hymans Robertson) as at 31 March 2013 has been provided to you. To the best of our knowledge and belief we confirm that the information supplied by us to the actuary was true and that no significant information was omitted which may have a bearing on his report.

K. Accounting Estimates

1. We believe that the significant assumptions we used in making accounting estimates, including those measured at fair value, are reasonable.
2. In respect of accounting estimates recognised or disclosed in the financial statements:
 - We believe the measurement processes, including related assumptions and models, we used in determining accounting estimates is appropriate and the application of these processes is consistent.
 - The disclosures relating to accounting estimates are complete and appropriate in accordance with the applicable financial reporting framework.
 - The assumptions we used in making accounting estimates appropriately reflects our intent and ability to carry out specific courses of action on behalf of the entity, where relevant to the accounting estimates and disclosures.
 - No subsequent event requires an adjustment to the accounting estimates and disclosures included in the financial statements.
