Budget Proposals Consultation

Introduction

Oxfordshire County Council has to set a budget every year. As part of that process
we invite comments residents, service users and stakeholders to have their say on
our budget proposals. This year we also sought feedback on the proposed Council
Tax level for 2017/18 that is included in our budget forecasts, and on the broad
purpose and priorities of the council.

Approach

- 2. On 8 December 2016 we published our budget papers for consideration by the Performance Scrutiny Committee on 15 December 2016. At the same time we opened an online consultation, hosted on the council's eConsult portal for people to have their say on our proposals and distributed paper copies of the documents to all public libraries.
- 3. The consultation was open from 8 December 2016 to 9 January 2017 and was publicised. A Freepost service was offered for paper submissions. People were invited to read the papers and prior to commenting. They were also provided with the following high level contextual information:

Your county council provides more than three-quarters of the local government services in the county. Our long term planning over many years to cope with increased demographic pressures in social care means that we will set a budget for 2017/18 - 20/21 on a solid and resilient financial footing after six years of difficult funding decisions. We have identified £16m of new financial pressures for the period 2017/18 to 2020/21 and have made proposals on how these pressures can be met.'

In total nine responses were received, including eight from Oxfordshire residents and one from a stakeholder group. Many people reiterated their points across all questions to reflect their strength of view.

Comments on the council's budget proposals

4. The tables below summaries the views expressed by question and theme. With regards to Council Tax, nobody actively disagreed with the level of increase but two submissions stated that the level of increase was 'unfair' and one person said it should be means tested.
