IMPROVING AND EXTENDING PROVISION FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE IN OXFORDSHIRE CHILL OUT BIDS FOR 2013/2014

Report by the Director for Children's Services

Introduction

- 1. Oxfordshire County Council believes that YOUTH MATTERS and has set up a fund of £100,000 to support work with children and young people across the county. The fund supports the aspirations of those working with children and young people in Oxfordshire to ensure all children and young people can access positive activities in their leisure-time by 2020.
- We know that how children and young people spend their leisure-time has an important influence and impact on their resilience and their quality of life. Engaging in constructive activities can increase children and young people's positive attitudes, improve motivation, increase aspirations, develop social and life skills, enhance interpersonal skills and help build social capital. All of which is vital for children and young people to help them avoid taking risks such as experimenting with drugs/alcohol or being involved in anti-social behaviour and crime. Participation in positive activities can also help increase the resilience of vulnerable children and young people who are trying to rebuild their lives. For children and young people with physical or learning disabilities it can be a lifeline and reduce social isolation. For groups such as young carers, positive activities provide respite and can improve their outlook and quality of life.
- 3. Projects must meet the broad aspirations above and be targeted at children and young people 8 19 years (extended to 24 years for young people with learning disabilities).
- 4. The Chill Out Fund will consider a wide range of bids supporting children and young people's access to positive activity. Applications for funding are invited that comply with the following criteria:
 - Aimed at children and young people 8 19 (up to 24 for those with learning disabilities).
 - Show evidence of the involvement of young people in the application.
 - Demonstrate increased access to positive leisure-time activity.
 - Show matched funding from a source external to the county council.
 - Demonstrate the ability to account for funding.
- 5. Applications will be considered on a monthly basis.

Witney Town Council has been working with the parents and children across the town and has now formed a working party for the playing fields. The parents have set up discussion groups and we hope will soon set up an independent Charity so they can apply for other funding from sources not open to Witney Town Council. Projects to refurbish all play areas are underway with consultation at each step, including a play day on 30th August 2013 at Burwell Recreation Ground (please see below for more information).

Please visit <u>www.facebook.com/SplashParkAtTheLeys</u> for details on how parents are becoming involved in the play area plans. This site currently has 1651 followers to date.

We have also received telephone calls and a letter from a concerned relative about the condition of the Burwell QEII site which is enclosed.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

Over the next year Witney Town Council wants to concentrate its efforts and resources on improving the Burwell QEII Community Play Area.

We would like to build a natural, all inclusive, play area to enhance the facilities on offer and build links with the public hall users and the wider community on the estate. The overall environment would benefit greatly from a more sympathetic scheme of play equipment.

We are seeking funding to help redevelop the Burwell QEII Community Play Area which is in urgent need of attention following feedback from residents. The current site only has a few pieces of play equipment and a single bench and the council has received public complaints about the facility being poor and their not being enough equipment for children of all ages.

Burwell Recreational area serves a large community and the site benefits from a Burwell Community Hall which is used regularly by local clubs, play groups and toddlers groups as well as hosting weddings and children's birthday parties for local families. The site is also well used by many local football teams (both children and adults) and will become the home ground of the Witney Vikings from September 2013. This means that the site will see much more footfall from families supporting their Dad, Son, Daughter, and an improved play area will give Mothers and other children the opportunity to play and socialise while still supporting their family member.

Witney Town Council is seeking funding to completely redevelop the play area at Burwell. This will include removing existing play equipment, improving the play area and resurfacing the site. This work will be carried out by Witney Town Council and is matched in the costs. Once this work is carried out Council employees will re-install the existing equipment (Monster Zip-Line, Wicksteed Spring Cockerel, Wicksteed Turnstile, and Wicksteed Cransley Metal Bench) and put in place the new equipment (Huck Play Ship, A E Evans Nest Swing, A E Evans Cradle Swing, Huck Viking Super Rope End Swinger and Proludic Roll Up). In addition we also hope to install two DDA Compliant picnic benches, plant some trees and install boulders to make the site more attractive (please see the attached plans of the site and equipment to be installed).

Burwell QEII Community Play Area is open to the public 365 days a year. There are no specific opening times and the site will not be fenced.

Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

Providing better playing resources for children in Witney is part of Council's ongoing plans over the next five years. We are hoping, with the support of funders, to upgrade and make all of our sites more user friendly for children of all ages. This site will include play equipment for children of all ages which it is currently lacking. The site will visually look more pleasing to the community as we will be using natural resources such as playbark, installing DDA Complaint Picnic Benches, planting a commemorative Oak tree, installing boulders and felled trees (which will be used as play equipment) and removing the existing railings (please note the felled trees are being recycled from dangerous trees removed from around the town).

We have also been working with the local police, schools, and college and hope to install graffiti walls at each of the sites at a later date.

As part of the Council's plans to support those living in the community, we are hosting a large family fun play day at Burwell Recreational Grounds on 30th August 2013 as part of its dedication as a Field in Trust. It is expected that we will have over 1,000 people on site together with a wide range of activities for children to participate in. On this day we will have a wide range of volunteers and play association organisations involved including The Health Bus, Oxfordshire Families Association, Parents and Children Together, Cottsway Housing Association plus many more stalls

run by local groups and organisations. On the day we will be telling families about plans for the Burwell and Leys site and we want to encourage people to get involved with volunteering, fundraising and feeling part of the community by discussing future developments, their wants, likes and needs.

How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

Playgrounds often act as focal points for the community, providing a meeting area for children and parents. They offer a place for children to play and forge new friendships, while ensuring they remain healthy and stay active.

Our aim is to provide a more inclusive stimulating environment for a wider range of children, incorporating toddlers to teens.

By providing these new facilities we will give children of all ages the chance to be inclusive and to enjoy an area which will be pleasing to the eye an environmentally friendly.

Describe how children & young people have been involved in this application (please attach any supporting documentation to demonstrate their involvement)

We now have a suggestion box with some very useful suggestions from the children attending the after school club about what they would like to see at the club. They made some excellent suggestions(copies of the summary of requests are enclosed. There were requests for computers, play stations and DVD games. We have explained to the children that we feel an adventure playground's strength is in being outside and active and working together. Computers can lead to people playing games and becoming isolated and we feel this is not a necessarily a good thing for BLAP though we are going to try to book the Blitz centre for a session of computer games in the autumn. There are some very interesting other suggestions You will see the requests about bikes. We have offered our first cycle repair workshop and plan to continue with these. We have kitted out a garage as a workshop. There are a number of requests for football goals and We would like to use £330 of the award to buy them goals. You will notice that they also mention a slide We have looked at the viability of buying a slide that we could fix to the blackbird structure. This would cost over 2000 and so we feel we will put it on hold for the time being but will seriously consider it next year. You will see that the other part of our request does not link with their ideas as they would not understand the importance of paying workers but it is an essential part of our service.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for Continuation and improvement of activities on offer at our after school club.

In the recent evaluation by children and parents there is a real affirmation of the ethos of the

playground and the enjoyment children have.

We would like to ensure the delivery of the club in the autumn. Our numbers are steadily increasing. Good art resources, ingredients plants and cycle repair kits all help to provide a club with a variety of enjoyable activities. Some of the equipment, for example the cargo net on our balance bars, and the table tennis table and CD player are getting very old. We would like to introduce a new activity of story board work which would involve children taking photos and videos. We have some excellent footage of something similar done when the playground was open before.

Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

In the 15 months since we have re-opened we have become a valuable resource for many parents and above all we are making a difference to the children who come to the after school club. This is borne out in statements from local schools and from parents and children. We want to continue the work we have started and to further improve the experience for the children.

In the recent evaluation of the after school club the comments from parents were very positive :"I know they are safe and having fun", "my son is gaining confidence and is able to express himself. He is very happy at BLAP" "(BLAP)makes her more sociable and confident", "freedom to play instead of watching TV" "she is very creative and enjoys making things"

The children also expressed their enjoyment and gave various examples of why they attended BLAP: "to make friends and to do activities", "everyone is friendly", "to have fun" They mention in particular the zip wire, the hammocks(made by them every day out of strong material) the art activities, the gardening and cooking.

Our children come mainly from Orchard Meadow (straight across the field) and from Pegasus(via a walking bus) Some walk down from Windale. The home school link worker from Orchard Meadow writes "Many of our children live in flats so after school may not have the opportunity to play outside or with their peers...BLAP is often the only place they can send their children that offers activities/entertainment at an affordable cost". The link worker from Pegasus wrote: "Your after school club provides a safe, secure and nurturing environment for many of our most vulnerable children. This is also an important resource for our working families who may still be on a low income as you provide good value and affordable childcare. You provide a nurturing environment, I have been particularly impressed by the homework help you have offered our students"

How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

Our numbers are steadily increasing. The children are learning to work together, to work through differences, to accept others who might be different from them. They are learning to garden, to discover what it is like to pick and pod peas, eat beans, enjoy strawberries, raspberries and later this summer, we hope, sweet corn. They enjoy cooking and learn health and hygiene rules. They have a free hand with arts and crafts and we love their creativity. They play snooker, pool, table tennis, connect 4 and much more. Most of their time is spent outside and they are getting their physical exercise without even realizing it. They are enjoying being children, playing imaginatively and learning how to negotiate as they play. As children come straight from school they will sometimes share their homework with the staff and staff will encourage children to read to them, to plan their story or to try their mathematical puzzles. They love to show staff their certificates and tell them how school has gone.

If there is a problem our Project leader calls the children together and as well as expressing his concerns he then allows all the children to have their say about what happened and how to put things right. We believe we are making a real difference to these children, they are being valued for who they are. This was recently reflected in a young boy's spontaneous initiative of creating a weekly award for the kindest child in BLAP. He made the first award and then each child receiving the award is charged with choosing the next recipient and creating the award.

We know too that for many parents the after school club is a God send. For those parents lucky enough to be in work we are providing a safe and enjoyable place for their children to be until the parent returns from work. We altered the closing time from 5 to 5.30 p.m. as a direct response to parents at work. For other parents with several children, or having problems with a particular child their time at BLAP allows the children to "blow off steam" in the fresh air at BLAP and therefore to return home happy and tired out and better able to sleep. Anything that helps the parents feel less stressed is also of benefit to the children.

During the sessions on 09/07/13 and 16/07/2013, the Youth Coordinator and volunteers engaged Venda's young people in discussions about what they most enjoy and value about Venda Club. The responses, in their own words, are set out in the accompanying document.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

Asylum Welcome would like to apply to the Chill Out Fund for money to run Venda Club. Venda is a once weekly youth club for Oxford based asylum seekers and refugees aged of 15 to 19. The club venue is 'The Mish', a basement in The Old Mission Hall, accessed via Boulter Street, owned and hired out by the Parish of Saint Clements. The venue offers a range of great activities including an XBox with overhead projector, a pool, table tennis table and table football. Young people can also play their music over the facility's sound system and enjoy the use of two computers with internet access. We provide stacks of fruit and healthy snacks. The club is managed and run by one paid worker (Asylum Welcome's Youth Service Coordinator) with the assistance of 3 to 4 trained, DBS checked volunteers per session. Volunteers regularly assist young people with their homework, with constructing a CV and applying for jobs or benefits online. The staff member is a qualified, registered social worker and can support and advocate for young people beyond Venda's hours in her capacity as Youth Service Coordinator at Asylum Welcome. Venda works in

partnership with the Terrence Higgins Trust granting young people bi-weekly access to sexual health and awareness advice. We try as far as possible to run throughout the year granting our youngsters a fixed point regardless of school calendar. During school holidays, if funds allow, we like to take our young people on a number of trips and outings. Summer 2012, for example, included trips to the National History Museum London, The London Eye, Go Ape! (Aylesbury), Blenheim Palace, the Kassam Stadium to watch Oxford United play West Ham United and the Sheldonian Theatre for a performance of Hamlet by the Globe Theatre Company.

Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

Venda Club offers more than an opportunity for young people to engage in the fun and enriching activities listed above. Our members are principally unaccompanied asylum seeking children, identified as children in need under section 17 of the Children's Act (1989) and accommodated by the local authority. They are referred to us by Oxford City's Looked After/Leaving Care teams and supported housing providers. Such vulnerable youngsters frequently struggle in their new lives, traumatised by the events that drove them from home. The staff member and volunteers strive therefore to offer sensitive, empathetic support. Whenever necessary, the staff member liaises with young people's social workers or key workers in supported housing. Our young clients feel strongly that Venda is their space (please see supporting document), they socialise with staff and visiting professionals, offer peer support and make decisions about the running of the club. It is immensely rewarding to watch these young people slowly find their feet and begin to build new lives for themselves and gratifying to think that Venda Club contributes to this.

How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

Without a good grasp of English, newly arrived asylum seeking children face an uphill battle to settle into school and begin to achieve to their potential. It is with this in mind that Venda Club aims to offer at least three English speaking volunteers per session to engage the young people and encourage them to practice their adopted language. Cultural expectations can also need to be picked up as swiftly as possible if a young person is to integrate successfully into British society. We offer a safe space to explore the differences between the culture and norms of home countries and those of the UK allowing young people to identify and internalise areas/issues that might cause them problems. For example in the last 12 months we have organised workshops on safe and considerate use of the internet and social media and with our partner staff member from the Terrence Higgins Trust we have engaged the boys in conversation on both sexual health and awareness and on forming/maintaining intimate relationships.

In each group of the drugs and alcohol workshops they get to choose at the end what activity they would like to do to celebrate their achievements on the course.

There are a number of options given however the majority across all of the groups is the winner, therefore Thorpe Park was chosen as this year's activity.

Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

Each agency benefits from working with the groups that are at risk as they get to meet and build relationships with young people who could be accessing their services later in their teenage life. A trip to Thorpe Park will help to build upon these relationships started in the workshops, but will also give a shared experience with the young people that the workers can use to help and aid better engagement in their service in the future.

How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

A day trip in the summer holidays is aimed at reducing any anti-social behaviour (ASB), drug and alcohol activities and any other risky activities that these groups will be associated in during the long summer holidays. This is achieved due to the long day trip that it is, thus taking them away from gathering in the parks or on the streets doing the above named activities. With the trip being free for those who attended the workshops it will enable those from lower income families to access the trip.

The young people will also benefit from this activity for the following reasons; It will give them something constructive to do but also develop their social skills as they go together in a large group. They will also get a better sense of well-being from doing a fun activity. Lastly they will be able to do something that gives them an adrenaline rush and excitement without the risks associated with drugs and alcohol and is completely legal.

A by product of the trip will be that the community will benefit from a reduction in ASB for that day. For example the TRAIN Detached team have identified an area in a park in Didcot that members of the workshops are gathering each day and there have been problems with ASB, litter and Drugs and alcohol. Therefore this trip will give them a positive alternative to doing the above activities. TRAIN will also been targeting those who are part of this group to come on this trip, which weren't on the workshops due to being in different age groups. Young People will play key roles in determining the details of the Young Achievers Dinner. They will be choosing which food and drink to make and serve on the night, designing the t-shirts worn at the Dinner and designing the venue decorations.

This will be the third year that young people from Barton will be hosting their own dinner for guests, designed to show off their new skills, celebrate their achievements and increase their aspirations. After our second Thrive Dinner last year (then Thrive Allotment Dinner), we carried out face-to-face evaluations with those involved.

From these evaluations, we discovered that those involved had really enjoyed taking part in the project, especially the trip to G&D's Ice Cream Parlour where they made their own flavour of ice cream which was also sold in shops. So once again we will be asking young people to suggest the types of food that they want to make, and we'll take them to Rectory Farm to let them see the processes behind growing food.

Many in the evaluations said they enjoyed being given extra responsibility throughout the project, with older teens enjoying helping younger children on some of the project tasks. As a result, part of this year's project will give some of the young people opportunities to take a lead on sub-projects, helping them to develop leadership and teamwork skills through this hands on approach.

Through evaluations, others told us how much they liked seeing their creations - be it the food or the decorations - on display and appreciated by others at the Dinner. Del, who was 12 at the time, said "I really enjoyed the look on people's faces when they found out that I was the chef." Skye (12) said "I've really enjoyed decorating the menus and serving the guests at the dinner." Therefore, the Young Achievers Dinner will focus on celebrating the achievements of the young people. We'll also open up more possibilities for them to use and display new skills, such as through a t-shirt design process (the best design worn by all the young people on the night) and involving young people in making videos to be shown during the evening's programme.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

Background:

The Thrive Team of staff and volunteers have been living on Barton estate since 2010, where we build relationships with disadvantaged and disengaged young people to help them discover hope and lasting change.

This 'live in' commitment can enable us to reach the young people who are the hardest to reach and can help us better understand what young people in this area of deprivation need.

"Our vision is to see communities thrive as young people experience hope and change."

Thrive is an initiative of Innovista, a Christian charity based in Oxford who despite working internationally, felt that local young people in deprived areas were not being given enough opportunities to flourish. As per Innovista's Equal Opportunities policy, Thrive work with young people of all faiths and none. Many - but not all - Thrive volunteers are Christians, who say that they are motivated to volunteer by their faith and sympathy with Thrive's values. Thrive's church project in partnership with Headington Baptist Church is funded by individuals and churches who are happy for their giving to be used in this way. Chill Out funding will be used to fund the Young Achievers Dinner only.

This project is approved by the Barton Youth Partnership (which has representation from the EIS team) which means that communication between ourselves and other service providers is clear and that there is no duplication in either service provision or in scheduling of activities.

Some changes have been made to the project since our unsuccessful application for Chill Out Funding in July. This includes reducing some resource costs, sourcing a venue which has been donated and also gaining sponsorship for four awards from local businesses to improve the sustainability of the project and secure matched funding. Chill Out Funding will enable the project to run at its optimal capacity and give young people an opportunity to showcase their new skills and be celebrated for their achievements.

The Project:

In Oxford 005a, which covers around half of Barton, only 24% of all pupils at the end of Key Stage 4 achieved higher than a C in English and Maths.

Unauthorised absence from school in Barton is around twice the national average (Neighbourhood Statistics for Sept 2010 - August 2011). In 2010, Oxford 005b was shown to have Oxford's highest index of deprivation for Education, Skills and Training, ranking in the top 2.5% in England.

We want to combat low levels of

attainment by engaging young people in positive activities, resourcing them to start and finish a successful project. We have found that working towards a very specific goal as a team brings a huge amount of satisfaction to young people and the feeling that they have achieved something, having learnt new skills and put them into practice to cook and serve their own food at a venue they've decorated. We expect 150 people to attend the Dinner this year, publicly recognising and celebrating the achievements of these young people, which in turn encourages them to aspire for more.

In previous years one young person who wasn't in education or employment went on to do a catering course after the Dinner. Another, who was excluded from school, found a job in a cafe and others have been involved in catering for two weddings requested by dinner guests.

Because it gives young people life skills to tackle obesity

Research published by the National Obesity Observatory (now Public Health England) in 2012 showed that 24% of 10-11 year olds in Barton and Sandhills were obese, up 3% on the previous year. Furthermore, the County Council's Joint Strategic Needs Assessment (2008) declares that Barton and Sandhills ranks joint lowest for self reported health and wellbeing in Oxford.

The Young Achievers Dinner gives 25 young people the opportunity to learn



where food comes from, how to cook nutritious food and promotes a healthy eating lifestyle. By involving young people from one of the city's most disadvantaged areas, some of whom are not in education, employment or training, we will be educating young people on not just the benefits of healthy eating, but also in the practical how to. Outcomes from previous years have seen young people learning to cook different kinds of soup and putting it into practice by choosing to cook for their families at home.

Because it offers a positive alternative to crime and anti-social behaviour

The City Council's regeneration plan for Barton (Oct 2012), ranks Barton's index of deprivation in crime as 'High'. Indeed, Oxford 005C ranks in the top 4% of most deprived areas in England in relation to crime, with young people especially at risk of getting involved in anti-social behaviour.

We believe that to help young people choose to not involve themselves in anti-social behaviour, we need to give them better choices. The Young Achievers Dinner will offer a positive alternative to involve themselves in a project that requires commitment and includes team building; providing an environment for positive relationships to be built. The Young Achievers Dinner also tackles some of the roots of bullying culture by including young people of different ages, working together on a shared goal and giving those who are older some responsibility to lead those younger than them, promoting positive inter-age relationships.

How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

They will learn new skills

25 young people will learn new skills in four different group (chefs, servers, drinks and canapés, design). These skills will increase their employability along with learning to work as a team towards a shared goal and developing greater interpersonal skills in a group of different ages and genders. Older teens involved in the project will develop leadership skills as they're given genuine responsibility.

Their improvement in this area will be measured by evaluation at the beginning and end of the project.

They will experience increased aspirations

Barton estate is an area of multiple deprivations, with young people struggling to achieve in ways that would help them break this cycle. This project will enable young people to experience a strong sense

of achievement in seeing a project through from start to finish. The same young people who decide what they will make are there to see 150 people eating what they've prepared and cooked in a venue they've decorated at an event designed to celebrate their achievements. We expect this to give them a great memory and the inspiration to continue to achieve. Certificates will be given out to each young person involved in the project at the Dinner, and there will also be a four awards for young people who have particularly excelled, rewarding their achievements, encouraging them to achieve more, and inspiring their peers.

Increase in aspiration will be measured through pre and post-project surveys.

They will have access to a positive activity

Each of the 25 young people involved will benefit from youth work sessions with young people between the ages of 11 and 19; learning to cook in a fun environment, making new recipes and decorations and being part of a very special evening that is designed to celebrate their achievements.

This project also allows us to engage with new young people who can then plug into other Thrive projects (mentoring, self-esteem group, youthwork) and who we can signpost to other youthwork that is available to them in Barton, thereby increasing their knowledge of the range of positive activities that are available to them.
