The Oxfordshire Youth Bus Project is a single deck bus that visits villages at prearranged times. The bus is installed with a wide variety of equipment specifically of interest to teenagers ie; Internet, WII, PS3, Video and Sound Recording facilities. The service is FREE OF CHARGE to the youngsters.

The bus is on site for 1 !/2 hours at a cost of £150 per visit.

The bus is managed by a qualified Youth Worker.

### Describe why this project is important

This project is of great importance to the teenagers as without it they have no focal point with the exception of the park to gather with their peers for purposeful activity. The current 168 dwelling development within the village will increase the number of youngsters in the village. The Bus Project will help the newcomers to integrate within the community. The players in the club were involved heavily in our last project which saw a focus on children aged 8 to 11, and now that they have seen the huge success, they have all asked that the club does the same for the higher age groups, from 12 to 17.

### Access to positive activity in children/young people's leisure-time Describe the project

The junior ice hockey club has a heavy bias of players in its younger age groups. For example, our Under 10 team has 17 registered members, whilst our Under 18 team has just 8 registered members.

The ice hockey club was able to purchase equipment for younger players after receiving our last grant which made a huge difference in attracting new members. We would now like to emulate the project for higher age groups, from ages 12 to 17.

Describe why this project is important

The equipment we have in our cupboard for higher age groups is very tatty and very limited. All of the good equipment is for the younger children. We do not have enough equipment to meet demand which means we are having to turn older children away when they come to try the sport. Without the success of this project we are preventing children aged 12 to 17 from being able to try out and join the club.

We have piloted this project five times; with the same target group in Dean Court Botley, young people in Witney who are homeless, and with looked after children. They have told us how valuable the experience has been:

'My bike is SICK! Gonna feel really proud when I ride this.'

'If I wasn't here I would be up to no good as usual 5/5.'

'There's not a lot to do at xxxx, so this has been great! 5/5'

I came cos I like bikes. It was really good!"

'You can already see a sense of belonging with the community centre.'

"Good ways to get kids off the streets and make their bikes safe".

The 17 yr old chair of Carterton Youth Council is on the steering group, and will offer peer support and help identify the young people the community most want to engage with, following recent consultations the Youth Council have conducted.

### 3. Access to positive activity in children/young people's leisure-time Describe the project

We are applying for funding to run a bike project in Carterton on the Shilton Park Estate having secured funding for the project at Base 33 in Witney. Pimp My Bike is a project aimed at those young people who are not engaging in positive activity at all. Young people bring their bikes, which are often unsafe, without brakes, and with bald tyres. They learn how to repair them with a bike mechanic, put on new tyres, brakes and cables to make them safe. They then strip their bikes and work with two artists to turn them into something they can be proud of. At the end of the project they have a bike they can maintain themselves, that is unique and something that gives them great pride and healthy transport.

There are huge tensions in the Shilton Park estate around young people and the community centre. There have been break-ins, vandalism and graffiti problems. The Early Prevention Partnership have identified the young people they most need to work with on antisocial behaviour, and these will be the young people we recruit onto this engagement project. We have built a partnership between Carterton Police, RAF Brize Norton, NAG, Cottsway Housing, the Base 33 youth centre, the town council and the Youth Council. Sgt Mags Turner stresses the importance of working with these young people at the earliest point, as they are at risk of entering the criminal justice system and are currently refusing to engage in their community at all.

We will work with Bike Clubs UK to provide a legacy of Bikeability and further bike mechanics courses, as well as other creative accredited opportunities, to ensure the sustainability of this work.

- To engage young people in Carterton and Witney who are not engaging in positive community activities
