Oxfordshire County Council is proposing to increase the published admission number of New Marston Primary School, Oxford from 1 form entry to 2 form entry, on a permanent basis from September 2012. To accommodate this growth in pupil numbers, there will be some extension of the school's buildings.

Objectives

10. The objectives of the proposals.

In recent years Oxford has experienced a significant and sustained rise in primary pupil numbers. To meet this demand, in 2008 an additional 105 primary school places across the city were agreed; in 2009 a further primary 245 additional places were created and in 2010 another 238 additional places were created. Looking to the future, significant additional housing is proposed in Oxford City Council's Core Strategy, which will, in turn, lead to increased pupil numbers across the city.

The proposal to expand New Marston Primary School is one part of the County Council's strategy to meet the need for primary school places in Oxford. The school agreed to take more than its admission number in September 2009 and 2010, accepting up to 60 children into the Reception (F1) class as part of the increased places noted above. A decision is now needed on whether to permanently expand the school to 2 forms of entry (with an admission number of 60) and to enlarge the physical capacity of the school.

Consultation

- 11. Evidence of the consultation before the proposals were published including—

 - a) Consultation was carried out with staff, governors and parents at New Marston Primary School and the other primary schools and secondary school in the local partnership; local early years providers; local residents; local councillors (parish, district and county) and MP; trade unions representing staff at the school; other Oxfordshire schools; CE and RC dioceses; and other interested parties.
 - b) An informal meeting was held for parents to discuss their concerns with the headteachers, school governors and County Council officer.

- Points raised included: building timescales, increase in traffic and a change to the current small community feel of the school.
- c) A consultation was carried out (17 January 2011 7 March 2011) to gather views on whether New Marston Primary School should be expanded to 2 form entry permanently. Ten responses were received. Two respondents raised no concerns on the proposal and supported it in principal, six respondents raised concerns about the proposal and two were neutral.

The reason given for supporting the proposal (by one respondent) was:

o Expansion will provide school places for local children.

The following concerns were raised by other respondents:

- Traffic at the start and finish of the school day and concern over additional pupils being local or from further afield. (4 respondents).
- Concern about sufficient permanent accommodation being guaranteed (3 respondents).
- The funding for additional staffing and other resources (3 respondents).
- Concern about the design of the new buildings, in particular with reference to the Hearing Impaired Base at the school and acoustic quality deemed necessary for these pupils. (2 respondents).
- Concern that the school would lose the "small school" atmosphere and that standards might fall. (2 respondents).
- Concern about the disruption of building works. (1 respondent).
- Concern about any effect it might have on the school's relationship to The Cherwell School. (1 respondent).
- That the school should avoid the use of fair banding for admissions (1 respondent).
- o That there is no detrimental effect on Catholic schools in the area.
- d) All applicable statutory requirements to consult have been complied with.
- e) The consultation leaflet is attached as Appendix 1. These were sent via the school to parents. Consultation leaflets were also sent to local early years providers, the local secondary school, local councillors and MP, and other stakeholders. The leaflet was also available on the county council's website.

Project costs

A feasibility study is underway to identify the options for providing additional accommodation to address the infrastructure issues related to this expansion.

The estimated cost of providing the additional classroom spaces in permanent buildings is in the region of £1m. Once the feasibility study has identified the preferred solution, costs and phasing options; funding will be allocated from within the County Councils Capital Programme 2011/12 onwards.

The proposal to expand New Marston Primary School is one part of the County Council's strategy to meet the need for primary school places in Oxford. The number of 4-year-olds needing school places has risen over the last few years, and is forecast to peak until at least 2012. This has led to increasing pressure on primary school places across Oxford.

To meet this demand, in 2008 an additional 105 primary school places across the city were agreed; in 2009 a further primary 245 additional places were created and in 2010 another 238 additional places were created.

By the application deadline for 2011 entry, the partnership of schools in this part of Oxford had received 477 first preference applications: if New Marston stayed at an admission number of 30, there would only be 447 Reception places. Late applications are expected.

Looking to the future, significant additional housing is proposed in Oxford City Council's Core Strategy, which will, in turn, lead to increased pupil numbers across the city.
