This is anticipated to be undertaken on an annual basis consistent with wider LTCP monitoring. The decision to implement CIL is a matter for those councils but it is expected in both cases that consultation on draft charging schedules will be held in 2024. In addition, discussions are underway to discuss the County's existing CIL arrangements with Oxford City, South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse Councils. There is a long-established process in place with South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse Councils for how the County accesses CIL monies to help support delivery of strategic infrastructure, which has recently been enhanced to speed up the transfer of monies through a less onerous approach to funding agreements between the Councils There is not the same structure in place for how the County accesses CIL collected in Oxford City. This is recognised as a priority for the County to resolve with contact made with City Council officers to review this as they progress their new Local Plan and CIL Charging Schedule in 2024.</i>
