### IMPROVING AND EXTENDING PROVISION FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE IN OXFORDSHIRE CHILL OUT BIDS FOR 2011

## Report by the Director for Children, Young People & Families

### Introduction

- 1. Oxfordshire County Council believes that YOUTH MATTERS and has set up a fund of £100,000 to support work with children and young people across the county. The fund supports the aspirations of those working with children and young people in Oxfordshire to ensure all children and young people can access positive activities in their leisure-time by 2020.
- 2. We know that how children and young people spend their leisure-time has an important influence and impact on their resilience and their quality of life. Engaging in constructive activities can increase children and young people's positive attitudes, improve motivation, increase aspirations, develop social and life skills, enhance interpersonal skills and help build social capital. All of which is vital for children and young people to help them avoid taking risks such as experimenting with drugs/alcohol or being involved in anti-social behaviour and crime. Participation in positive activities can also help increase the resilience of vulnerable children and young people who are trying to rebuild their lives. For children and young people with physical or learning disabilities it can be a lifeline and reduce social isolation. For groups such as young carers, positive activities provide respite and can improve their outlook and quality of life.
- 3. Projects must meet the broad aspirations above and be targeted at children and young people 8 19 years (extended to 24 years for young people with learning disabilities).
- 4. The Chill Out Fund will consider a wide range of bids supporting children and young people's access to positive activity. Applications for funding are invited that comply with the following criteria:
  - Aimed at children and young people 8 19 (up to 24 for those with learning disabilities).
  - Show evidence of the involvement of young people in the application.
  - Demonstrate increased access to positive leisure-time activity.
  - Show matched funding from a source external to the county council.
  - Demonstrate the ability to account for funding.
- 5. Applications will be considered on a monthly basis.

Describe how children & young people have been involved in this application (please attach any supporting documentation to demonstrate their involvement)

Soundabout works with profoundly disabled children and young people. Most of who come to our project with their parents and/or carers and siblings. We consulted with over 75 families about our Saturday community music sessions, the 28 replies demonstrated the need for these sessions and the positive impact of the music making experiences on the children's development, confidence and communication and the family's wellbeing. Families overwhelming response was that they wanted to be involved in our new project Soundabout Music Sense project in Oxford city. Here are some views from our consultation: (we are attaching additional comments for reference).

- "Our child is generally denied access to universal services, due to his disabilities and vulnerability. Families
   NEED this kind of provision as it has huge benefits to the child attending which impact on his happiness,
   behaviour, self-esteem and family life in general"
- "It's wonderful to meet other families with severely disabled children in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere.
   We all join in as equals... we don't have to plan, check if it is suitable, just turn up. We come away refreshed!"
- "Soundabout's work has had a profound impact on my son's ability to interact, engage and enjoy all that life has to offer"
- "I needs a lot of sensory stimulation, we have found this is the only suitable club for him and it helps to reduce his tactile defensiveness / autistic tendencies"

## What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

Soundabout will run family weekend sessions for children and young people (9-24yrs old) with disabilities and their families in Oxford city. These sessions will bring whole families together to share music making and these include 'Commusication' sessions for children from 9-16 years of age, 'Songquest' sessions for young people aged from 16-25 years and 'Sound Space' sessions for young people 16-25 years of age with autism along with their parents, carers and siblings.

In the April 2011 survey, we were asked by some familes if we could run music sessions in Oxford city this year, so, we were delighted when we had an opportunity to collaborate with Helen and Douglas house hospice who are offering us space (in kind) to run our sessions. This will mean children and young people who live close to Oxford will be able to come along to our sessions. So, from September 2011, Soundabout will be running new family music making sessions at Helen and Douglas House in Oxford - twelve morning and afternoon sessions per term for two terms (Sept-Dec 2011 and Jan-March 2012); however, we need financial support to set up this new project.

Please note that we have had two fundraising events in June this year to help pay for our next six months of family music sessions. We are delighted to have been able to raise just over half of the money needed to run these sessions (please see budget sheet for details).

## Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

Soundabout aims to unlock the potential of children, young people and young adults with profound physical disabilities and learning difficulties by helping them to develop their ability to communicate and interact with the world around them through music and sound. Soundabout's methods are designed specifically to encourage interaction, build relationships and bring the joy of participation to everyone in the family. Many families have been joining us regularly for years now and greatly value the opportunity for them all to enjoy music making together. We really want to offer families in and around Oxford city to have similar experiences together.

We think the families we work with best explain the importance of our project:

- "M loves Soundabout! He very much enjoys the musical aspect of the sessions, but also benefits hugely from the opportunity to socialise with peers in a safe, secure and encouraging environment. He can be himself, learn life skills like turn-taking, but most importantly he loves the fact that it is his special activity that we as a family can join in and talk about"
- "How can you place a value on what Soundabout offers? It allows children with no other way of expressing themselves – a voice. They are among equals – all can join in. Families get a break and a good afternoon out.
   Rare if not impossible to find something we can all enjoy together."
- "S is non-verbal and has very limited hand function. As a consequence he has great difficulty in joining in regular activities. At Soundabout S is usually the most active participant in the group. Taking part in this way provides valuable release form his usual daily frustrations"
- "Easing D's frustrations relieves the pressure on all of us. Soundabout is usually his favourite activity of the month. He comes home more relaxed and at case with himself than at any other time. When D is happy – we are all happy!"
- "Soundabout has given my daughter a lot more confidence; she is able to explore movement of her body to sound and sensation. She enjoys sessions when different musical instruments are played. She also enjoys being with other children"

## How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

(please see quotes above) Soundabout has been running family community music sessions from Worminghall village (which is on the outskirts of 'Oxfordshire for over 5 years). We have been hoping to come and work in Oxford city for many years and the consultation we carried out in April clarified for us that we need to provide our community music sessions for children and young people and their families in Oxford. We know what our sessions do has a powerful benefits for all families of profoundly disabled children and young people. We also know that starting our new sessions in Oxford city will benefit many more families who have been unable to some out to Worminghall to our sessions.

Members of the Chalgrove Youth Centre are aware off the pending Oxfordshire County Council Youth Worker redundancies, and are aware that the Chalgrove Parish Council will have to find replacement Youth Workers in order to open the Youth Centre on a Monday and Thursday evening.

It is proposed that a select group of young people will be involved within the recruitment process by contributing to the Job Description and Vacancy Advertisements, as well being part of the interview panel.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

Chalgrove Parish Council and Oxfordshire County Council currently contribute towards two Youth Workers to work two nights within the Chalgrove Youth Centre. Our OCC Youth Workers are to be made redundant in August 2011 and the Chalgrove Parish Council wish to recruit two Youth Workers on a self employed basis to work two nights (Monday & Thursday). For a 12 month period.

The Chalgrove Parish Council have not precepted for the increase in Youth Worker costs; the increase being incurred due to no longer having financial support from OCC Youth Services division.

#### Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

Chalgrove is a 'young Village' and the Chalgrove Parish Council endeavour to provide a place for the young people to congregate, without causing a nuisance elsewhere in the Village.

Young people with Learning Disabilities in the above age range have expressed a desire for this club. In order to help make it happen they have committed themselves to raising money. They are doing this through sponsored events, selling cakes and sweets they have made, and home collection boxes with family and friends.

We asked some potential Moving on club members what they would enjoy and they said the following:

"I like to be able to talk to my friends about scores (football) and college" Sean

"I like going on buses" James

"I like cinema, pubs and dog racing" Chris

In addition please see attached summary of questionnaires from current attendees of one of our existing clubs (LISTEN)

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

We already run two evening leisure projects for young people and adults with a learning disability. One caters for young people age 10 to 18 (LISTEN) and the other for people over

18 (OX18). Our LISTEN group is very full partly because members are reluctant to leave when they turn 18. They are comfortable among their peers and feel daunted by the prospect of joining a much older group. They would of course be welcome at OX18, but again this club is quite full and caters for all ages over 18. An 18 or 19 year old may not naturally socialize with a person over 50

So, we would like to start a club for young people with learning disabilities aged 16 to 24. It would serve as a transition stage between our two other clubs. It would run on a different night and be open to members of both clubs who fell into the age category. It would also be open to others from the surrounding area. The club would be based in our premises in Madley Park, Witney. Our existing clubs draw people from many of the surrounding villages. The co-ordinator would provide transport to and from the club for members from Carterton and those en route, who we know would find it particularly to difficult to attend otherwise. We would charge £2 per trip for this to cover fuel costs.

We would organize activities very much in consultation with the members of the club, and suggestions received so far include: trips to the cinema or bowling, attendance of sporting events, film evenings, pamper evenings, Karaoke, discos, cooking. We would use existing staff already employed by Guideposts and so would be able to open Moving On very quickly after hearing the funding decision.

We would use the Chill Out Fund as a start up grant to get the project off the ground and give us time as an organization to raise money for it to continue.

Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

At present these young people are in danger of losing their one regular evening out. It is not possible for us to accommodate them in LISTEN as this would not be right for the younger members, and yet they are not ready to make the leap into OX18.

Their particular needs and wishes are not catered for by any other local group. They do not feel comfortable in mainstream venues used by people of their age and indeed would be very vulnerable in such places on their own.

These young people already face fundamental changes in the core aspects of their lives as they move from fulltime education into less certain day time occupations. This is also a worrying time for their families. By providing a group particularly for this age group, which can be accessed from age 16, we hope to offer an element of stability in their lives and a forum where worries and uncertainties can be shared and peer support offered.

How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

The social needs of young people with Learning Difficulties are often overlooked and they become a hidden group in the evening with little they feel able to do. This can result in frustration and unhelpful behavior. Our work with young people and adults with Learning Disabilities has taught us the value of socializing as a means of building friendships and informal support networks both for everyday activities and for when hard times strike such as bereavement or changes in paid support. Forming friendships with peers helps to build confidence and create healthy interests in activities which everyone can enjoy.

Members would also have the chance to practise independent living skills such as personal hygiene and grooming, basic cookery, travel skills and handling money. These would all be achieved as a bi-product of the main social focus of the group.

We would also include volunteers in the running of the club. This would allow club members to socialize with mainstream peers and allow volunteers to gain valuable experience in working with this client group. At Guideposts we make it our practice to welcome volunteers in the running of our services and have found that many such volunteers have been enabled to apply for paid work in this field as a result.

Supporting young people with Learning Disabilities to take part in supervised activities in the local area such as visits to cafes, pubs, special events, helps to break down barriers with the local community. Some of our service users have experienced prejudice or even hostility from local businesses and we feel it is important to support them through this by increasing their visability in the community.

Youngsters from the Youth Club began a petition to raise awareness about the state of the existing playground. They presented their findings to the Parish council and went to a Parish Council meeting to ask for support in their plan to refurbish the existing playground. They have a series of fund raising activities planned, including a Carwash and Fete on the 16<sup>th</sup> July.

Members of the parish council, helpers and young people from the youth club have formed a planning group. This group has been in touch with Nicole O'Donnell from the Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association and she has given us a list of places to get funding from and general advice about the number of Playground firms to approach.

Children from the playgroup, primary school, Rainbow Guides, Scouting organizations, Little Pippins pre-school and the youth club have all been asked for their ideas and we have put together a 'wish list' of equipment we would like. Parents have also been asked for ideas and we have been visiting other playgrounds to try equipment.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for) We plan to replace and update worn-out playground equipment which is focused mainly on older children, and create play opportunities for younger children who currently have little suitable equipment available. This will create a new, attractive and exciting facility for the use of all the village children as well as visitors to the area.

The playground was created some 30 years ago and has been well used by the community since this time. It has also dated as new equipment has become available which creates a more stimulating active environment for children. We need to replace the existing equipment with a

range of activities to suit all ages. On our wish list we have an Ariel runway, rope bridge, nest swing and climbing frame/space net for teenagers. The younger children have requested more exciting things to play on like Springers and rockers, climbing house towers and a roundabout. We already have swings and a slide which we will repaint.

We have started collecting brochures from Playground firms and have arranged site surveys. We have started applying for grants from WREN, Tesco Community awards, The Midcounties Co-operative Community Team and the Oxfordshire Community Foundation Grants.

#### Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

Our playground was rebuilt in 1986, when the village celebrated its 1000 year anniversary, before many of us were born, and apart from some safety surfaces, has had very little done to it since. Much of the equipment was built by local groups at the time, and is now rotting and becoming dangerous so has to be removed. There are wooden steps which have become unsafe and need to be replaced to allow small children and people with disabilities to access the mound which is a central feature of the play area. The equipment that is left is limited to swings, a slide, one rocker, two tunnels and some large mounds. There is limited play equipment for small children. Our playground should be a place that all youngsters want to go to and it is not like that at the moment.

## How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

Every village needs a playground where Mums and Dads can take youngsters and teenagers can hang out. Some of us have younger brothers and sisters and we would like to do something for them and make it more exciting for us! It will make an exciting outdoor play area which will encourage children and young people to be active and play together.

Sometimes the young adults from Home Farm Trust come and use our playground and we would like it to be strong, long lasting and challenging to welcome young people for all parts of the community and provide somewhere they can play together.

We have consulted with young people on the street in and around the Blackbird Leys area of Oxford, as to the needs within their area, many of whom expressed a wish for greater levels of positive activities during the evenings and at weekends to help keep them out of trouble. They particularly expressed a desire for a football based project as this was their main interest outside of school. Although the project will more than likely engage more boys than girls, the social element of including vibrant music together with the fun, informal and inclusive environment being created, we have no doubt that this activity will attract a number of girls to take part also.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

We intend to deliver a twelve-week Street Soccer League for children and young people living in the Oxfordshire area, delivering 12 weeks of inclusive and fun Street Soccer sessions on Saturday Afternoons. Delivered between 12.00noon – 4.00pm, the sessions will consist of participants playing in 1v1 skills battles within a Street Soccer Cage, receiving skills coaching and listening to music played through portable sound system. The activities will provide children and young people in the area with the opportunity to keep fit and healthy, reduce boredom and in turn help reduce anti-social behavior in the area. We aim to engage with over 600 young people over the course of the project.

Funding from the Chill Out will not only help with the capital and revenue costs involved in the project but will also provide us with time to source additional long-term funding in order create sustainability for the activity to continue.

Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

With high-levels of anti-social behavior and due to financial constraints, many young people in the area are unable to afford to pay or participate in formal clubs, meaning therefore that free, informal and positive activities are essential to ensure that all young people are included and therefore lead to healthy more social and active lifestyles.

In the initial design phase of the Community Mentoring Programme, we consulted widely with many local residents and young people through our detached youth work. As we have a constant presence on the estate, we regularly have conversations with local young people and their families on the design of the programme, young people's needs, how to best support them and how to achieve success. This is being done both informally during detached youth work and formally through feedback from young people and their families in the pilot phase of the scheme.

"My older brother has been mentored for eight months and I've seen how it's helped him to behave better. I keep asking for a mentor because I know that my behaviour is bad and I want to behave better like him." Response from 'B', who lacks parental support. 'B' is one of many young people who regularly ask for a mentor. The demand from mentors from young people is far greater than our current capacity.

Young people have also been involved via input from local service providers for young people who have contributed to the design and implementation of the programme, including:

- Bayards Hill and Cheney Schools. Involved in design of mentoring programme and refer pupils.
- Family Support Teams I & II and the Family Intervention Project contact us regularly with referrals for mentoring and support of vulnerable young people in difficult family situations.
- Youth Workers Kevin Jackson and Melanie Jewel -- informal consultation and referrals
- Pc Chloe Sutton liaises with the team and informal referrals
- Liaise with Alston Quammie (Play Barton) to identify vulnerable young people for additional

- support
- Chris Trent (Senior Youth Worker and Cheney School Coordinator) works with Thrive to support at-risk pupils from Cheney School.
- Barton Youth Partnership are consulted on all initiatives.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

- Select and train 20 volunteer Community Mentors who commit to meeting weekly with the young person they are mentoring.
- Identify and select 20 young people from Barton to be mentored (referred by local service providers such as schools, Family Intervention Project, Council Youth Workers and Community Police.)
- Young people and Mentors complete the Community Mentoring Programme
- Mentoring Objectives will be tailored to each young person, in coordination with local service providers such as Bayards Hill School, Council Youth Workers, FIP and Community Police. Each young person's progress toward their individual mentoring objectives will be regularly reviewed and the mentor will also review progress with their supervisor.
- In line with Best Practice, the volunteer Community Mentors are given regular supervision and ongoing training by qualified Thrive Youth Workers.

Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

### The Need

"Barton & Sandhills 14 has the greatest deprivation in Oxford in terms of education, skills and training" (Oxford Safer Communities Partnership, April 2011). According to the English Indices of Deprivation (2010), the estate is in the bottom 2% for Children and Young People's Education. Barton is one of the "pockets of deprivation" identified in Oxfordshire 2030.

Many young people are at risk of school exclusion, offending and family breakdown. Youth mentoring provision has been reduced since 2009, and is likely to be further reduced. Barton's status as a satellite hub means that youth workers will only be able to meet the needs of a small number of the most vulnerable young people. Other young people who have not been selected for this provision are in need of targeted support.

#### Our response

In response, we set up Thrive (Barton) – a team of staff and volunteer youth workers, with the core team resident on the estate.

Together the team deliver an integrated youth work programme that has been designed in consultation with local young people, residents and service providers.

The **Thrive Community Mentoring Programme** is a critical part of this. It provides positive role models and individual support for some of the most vulnerable young people in the community, as they work towards a specific life goal.

By developing friendships and engaging in constructive activities, volunteer Mentors help young people develop positive attitudes and motivation to improve life skills, connection with community, health and well-being. Each Mentor and young person agree objectives, such as returning to formal education or enhancing interpersonal skills.

Regular supervision is provided for the mentors, helping them to 'trouble shoot' and implement appropriate next steps in pursuit of the young person's goal.

20 vulnerable young people have been selected for mentoring in consultation with local schools, the Family Intervention Project, the Youth Support Service and the Community Police.

We are working with Sarah Burrows, East Oxford Early Intervention Service Manager, to put in place a process to identify young people who would benefit from mentoring without duplicating the work of the Early Intervention Team.

Thrive is collaborating with a wide range of service providers to maximise the joined-up support for at-risk young people in Barton.

#### How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

We target some of the most at-risk young people, referred by local service providers including Bayards Hill School, Council Youth Workers, Family Intervention Project and Community Police. Trained Volunteer Mentors meet each week with their young person to provide positive role models and individual support and to work towards a specific life goal.

Mentoring Objectives are tailored to each young person, in coordination with the agencies mentioned above. Typical objectives include reintegration into school, interpersonal development and behavioural goals.

#### **Case Study**

In the pilot phase, Jem Todd is mentoring a young person ('G') who had been out of school for over a year.

When Jem met him, he had no plan to return to formal education.

Jem has supported him through the process of returning to school - built his confidence, overcame his negative feelings and prepared the transition to formal education. He has now returned to a full timetable.

Jem is advocating for him and assisting the school to cope with his behavioural issues.

School staff, community police, family, and the wider community report vastly improved behaviour, attitudes and attainment.

We aim to support 20 vulnerable young people like 'G' each year in Barton to achieve significant life goals and become a positive influence in their community.

The projects we are applying for, Kids Adventure and Magdalen Young Carers Project, are both student-led, and therefore are organized by young people (18-22 years) for young people. The aim is to provide fun and engaging activities for vulnerable children and young people in the Oxfordshire area. Both projects are run by a student project coordinator and a committee who are responsible for managing the project, liaising with the partner organisations, managing volunteers, organizing the activities, budgeting and funding. The one-to-one ratio of volunteers to children ensures that the views and opinions of the beneficiaries of the project are always taken into account, and that they are part of the planning process, through focus groups and suggestion sheets. The activities aim to help the children grow in confidence, and so making decisions and deciding what activities should take place in future helps to achieve this goal.

Volunteers regularly collect feedback from the children on how beneficial they found the activity day. Please see below for sample feedback from children who benefited from Kids Adventure:

#### Feedback from Kids Adventure

• 100% said they wanted to come on another Kids Adventure day

- 80% rated the day as "brilliant" overall; the remaining 20% rated it "good"
- 60% rated the KA leaders as "really friendly"; 20% rated them as "friendly" and 20% rated them as "OK" Particular highlights have included: "parachute games"; "in the park with the deer"; "ice-creem" [sic]; "the tour & ice-cream"; "when we went on the photo tour!!!"; "hoolahooping"; "ice cream"; "pictures"; "all of it".

## What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

Oxford Hub Community Volunteers (OH:CV) is a student-led volunteering initiative which mobilises Oxford University students to tackle the needs of the local Oxford community, and make a real difference. The Chill Out funding would be used to finance two OH:CV projects which provide activity days for vulnerable children between the ages of 8-19. These two projects are:

- Oxford Kids Adventure

### - Magdalen Young Carers Project

Oxford Kids Adventure provides activity days for children who have been identified by Social Services as in need of one-to-one adult attention, while Magdalen Young Carers Project work with young people faced with the challenge of caring for a loved one. Both projects organise a day of exciting activities for these young people. Although the projects run independently, they are able to share some training sessions, equipment and resources, information and knowledge which helps to make them particularly efficient and effective.

The aim of the activity days is to provide a fun, engaging, safe and supportive environment in which vulnerable children and young people can have fun – and behave like children. Both projects work with small groups of young people at any given time, and have a ratio of at least one volunteer to each child, this ensures that meaningful relationships can be built between volunteers and the children. This one-on-one attention helps to build self esteem, social skills and a sense of wellbeing. The activities provided are broad; from sports to music and arts, to introduce children to hobbies and interests which they otherwise may not have had the chance to experience. The interaction with university students, and the chance to spend time in an Oxford college on the activity days, helps to broaden the horizons and inspire future aspirations for the beneficiaries of these projects.

Past activities have included baking, graffiti, face painting, a photo treasure hunt, rounders. In the future the groups would like to organise more cultural activities, including trips to Oxford's many museums and heritage sites.

## Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

The Kids Adventure and Magdalen Young Carers project are particularly important, as they are providing services for some of the most marginalised and disadvantaged children in Oxford. The provision of fun, safe activities for young people who have difficult family lives improves their confidence, skills and broadens horizons, as well as giving them the opportunity to have fun, and meet other children in similar circumstances. For many of the children the activity days provided by these projects are a life-line, which significantly contribute to their wellbeing and also to their future choices.

Both projects are run by enthusiastic student volunteers who are keen to give something back. As a student in Oxford University, the decentralised University system and short terms can make it difficult to engage with the local Oxford community. Students want to run the Kids Adventure and Magdalen Young Carers' projects as they are able to contribute positively to the Oxford community, while also learning new skills and having fun.

In addition to the activities which are currently running, there is also huge scope for expansion of these services to more disadvantaged young people across Oxfordshire. As more and more services for disadvantaged young people are being cut, the Kids Adventure and Magdalen Young Carers projects are becoming increasingly important to the young people they serve.

### How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community?

The Kids Adventure and Magdalen Young Carers Projects benefit children and young people in the community by providing safe, enjoyable activities. As these activities are targeted at some of the most vulnerable children and young people in the area, they have a huge impact.

Ultimately, these projects provide a safe space for children and young people to relax, away from the stress which they may experience in their home lives. This time to enjoy themselves, improves their sense of wellbeing and contributes to happier, healthier children. Spending time with children in similar situations, helps fight feelings of isolation and loneliness while allowing them to develop vital social skills. In addition, the activities provided allow the young people to develop new skills, leisure interests and to broaden their horizons. This builds the confidence of the young people, and affects their future choices. Finally, meaningful contact with university students helps to dispel many myths about university and further education, providing positive role models and mentors.

What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

The project is simply the purchase of a new boat of suited to junior rowers. The boat would be a coxed quad from Wintech Racing, without a design crew weight of 60 kg, plus suitable ours. Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?) The club is very short of junior equipment. Boats are designed for specific crew weights . Currently, junior crews are frequently 'orerboated', having to row in boats designed for much heavier crews. In particular, the girls J14 crew have to race in a heavyweight men's boat.

How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community? All young people especially ones suffering from mental health issues, homelessness and exclusion need the benefit of taking part in positive activities, as well as advice and food. This work is supported by research carried out by Broadway, a leading charity, together with the Primary care Trust. Young people involved have reached out to other young people making them aware of the provision and its current and prospective benefits.

This programme is a continuation (or third class). Following a successful first and second, there has been a real demand for teaching Swahili especially from young people with roots from Swahili speaking nations.

We concluded last years class which was unfunded but in conjunction with the church providing half the funding and a local East African Dj to host a well know Swahili musician who graced the occasion here in Oxford.

There has been a demand in the session but we could not manage to negotiate more funding other than what has been allocated by the church for such programs which is slightly over £2000.

Another development is that we have managed to negotiate with the Regal Community Centre and there has been a space which we can rent with the church agreeing to fund decoration, buy 3 computers and give access to video camera to record progress and archive.

Early Intervention Programme – Heritage has developed from a play group to a more serious and focused programme where children are engaged in meaningful activities to inspire and help create and develop an interest with an aim of providing knowledge, skills and self confidence to enable them make healthy informed choices about their future in a fun filled cultural environment.

The EIP - Heritage teaches Swahili by using books, media, music and drama. It teaches young people about other cultures. The project also benefits from visiting Eastern African professors, scholar and musicians who inspire young people in sessions.

Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

EIP – Heritage is important because it inspires, helps create and develop new interests, provides knowledge, skills, self confidence and understanding of other people helping us to respect them.

Swahili is spoken in more than 10 African countries and with East Africa being one of the main tourist destination in Africa, the need of communication and understanding of culture is important during visits. Young people born to African immigrants are disadvantaged because they cannot communicate with their grandparents or relatives when they travel abroad. As other young people enjoy a loving and expressive relationship, African young people miss out on this relationship.

The project has come from discussion by meetings of the 16 member Sweatbox Union youth forum about what we can do to make the Sweatbox Youth Centre a cool, pro youth environment able to offer a more attractive alternative to young people than hanging around street corners, shopping centres or drinking in parks. The Sweatbox Union, Squidgers (our nickname for young volunteers) in partnership with youth workers have come up with a number of ideas. The 'Can O' Peas' Ultra Violet Venue project was thought to be the most fun and exciting and would have most impact on improving the youth centre.

Sweatbox Union meeting minutes 4.6.11 are attached

Item 7 Sweatbox Closure / Redevelopment Item 9 Can' O' Peas What do you want to do? (please describe the project you want funding for)

The project is to transform the tatty patio area located at the side of the Sweatbox2 into a unique open air, all weather, multi function arts space for dance, music and theatre performances, to screen films, hold meetings or to just hang out

Incorporating an £8000 10m x 10m permanent canopy erected over the patio (funded by King Alfreds College) we would like

- 32 young people to work with a specialist artist to create eight 5m x 3.5m 'positive images of youth culture' themed murals using ultra violet paint. The murals will be painted/ sprayed on hanging heavy duty Vinyl panels which will form removable walls to the 'Can 'O' Peas' (Canopy)
- 2. Install UV floods and LED stage lighting under the canopy.
- 3. Build a low raised stage area with protected electricity supply
- 4. 60 young people to work with a professional artist to create 28 'youth culture' themed stained glass windows using specialized plastic film and lead substitute in the windows surrounding the patio
- 5. install 12 reclaimed plastic 8 seat 'Rainbow' commercial picnic benches for audience seating.
- 6. Support young people to run an ongoing programme of youth events and activities under the Can 'O' Peas

#### Why is your project important? (and why do you want to do it?)

As part of a local solution to keep the Sweatbox open we need to attract high numbers of young people to come to the youth centre and generate income. We must make the space we use as attractive as possible given that it is located at the back of a school, not always the easiest place to attract young people to come in their free time, especially those that may be most disaffected from main stream education.

Previous activities and events on the patio have on been popular due to the open air aspect and the large physical space for lots of people. However use of the patio is always determined by good weather and limited seating capacity. A covered canopy with detachable side walls and dedicated seating area would allow us to use the space all year round.

The UV murals on the interior side panels will allow us to create a very cool neon themed pro youth environment which can be easily erected for youth events or taken down for everyday use.

The existing patio space is in poor repair, surrounded on 3 sides by ugly metal casement windows. Getting young people to design stained glass (Plastic film) panels would transform the area and make sensational pro youth images viewed from inside or outside the building, especially when backlit in winter evenings. Young people have expressed how important it is to have positive images of youth given the media's tendency to portray young aggressive hoodies !

How will your project help or benefit children and young people in the community? The project supports the most expressed need by young people of having somewhere to go and something to do by providing an opportunity for young people to create and manage an exciting venue for youth music and arts.
