NORTHMOOR - PROPOSED 20MPH & 30MPH SPEED LIMITS

Report by Director of Environment and Highways

RECOMMENDATION

The Cabinet Member is RECOMMENDED to:

a) Approve the proposed introduction of 20mph and 30mph speed limits in Northmoor, as advertised.

Executive Summary

1. The report presents responses to a statutory consultation on the proposed introduction of 20mph and 30mph speed limits in Northmoor, as shown in **Annex 1**.

Financial Implications

2. Funding for consultation and the proposals themselves has been provided by the County Council's 20mph Speed Limit Project.

Legal Implications

3. No legal implications have been identified in respect of the proposals, with proposed changes to existing Traffic Regulation Orders governed by the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and other associated procedural regulations. Failure to adhere to these statutory processes could result in the proposals being challenged.

Equality and Inclusion Implications

4. No implications in respect of equalities or inclusion have been identified in respect of the proposals.

Sustainability Implications

5. The proposals would help to encourage walking and cycling within Northmoor by making them safer and more attractive.

Formal Consultation

6. Formal consultation was carried out between 13 June and 05 July 2024. A notice was published in the Oxford Times newspaper, and an email sent to statutory consultees & key-stakeholders, including Thames Valley Police, the Fire & Rescue Service, Ambulance service, Bus operators, countywide transport, access & disabled peoples user groups, West Oxfordshire District Council, local District Cllrs, Northmoor Parish Council, and the local County Councillor representing the Eynsham division.

Statutory Consultee Responses:

- 7. Thames Valley Police re-iterated their views concerning OCC's policy and practice regarding 20mph speed limits and wish their response to be listed as 'having concerns' rather than an objection, with the concerns also applying to the proposed 30mph speed limits.
- 8. Oxford Bus Company offered no objection; however, they did suggest that if services between Bampton and Oxford (via Eynsham) which were withdrawn by the County Council in 2016 were to be reconsidered, the proposals would make the re-provision of passenger transport economically & practically challenging.

Other Responses:

9. 53 responses were received via the online consultation survey during the course of the formal consultation, and these are summarised in the table below:

Officer Response to Objections/Concerns

- 12. The main purpose of the scheme is to encourage greater use of active travel by reducing speeds; this is also expected to reduce accidents. The aim of reducing speed limits is to change driver's mindsets to make speeding socially unacceptable and make more environmentally friendly modes of travel such as walking and cycling more attractive and also reduce the County's carbon footprint. This forms part of a countywide programme of works that seeks to deliver 'a safer place with a safer pace'.
- 13. The concerns of Thames Valley Police comprise observations applicable to the overall 20mph project noting also their observations and concerns also applied to the proposed 30mph speed limits but no site-specific comments relating to the proposals for Northmoor.
- 14. The authority considers objections along the lines of it being unjustified, anticar, a waste of money, not enforceable or pointless to not warrant amendments to a proposal. As such the authority has not addressed any specific comments made of this nature in this report.



Concerns – This response applies to both Speed Limit changes. Thank you for the consultation documents, in relation to the proposed speed limit change. Thames Valley Police welcome the opportunity to engage on plans for road safety improvement and acknowledge that 20mph limits can be a useful tool in road safety. There are other reasons 20mph limits may be desirable for communities, such as environmental concerns, and creating a shared space environment to encourage greater diversity of road users. Compliance with 20mph limits is a challenging issue as there is a difference between the achievable results of the various available schemes. For example a sign-only scheme will only have a limited effect on the mean speeds, as opposed to other schemes that influence the road environment, which is recognised as being key to achieving compliance. If a speed limit is set too low and is ignored then this could result in the vulnerable road user being less safe. It can also cause a disproportionate number of drivers to criminalise themselves and could bring the system of speed limits into disrepute. Thames Valley Police have no policy to enforce based on arbitrary speed limits alone but will enforce based on threat of harm, risk and resourcing. 20mph limits are not excluded from this and will be enforced where appropriate. There should be no expectation that the police would be able to provide regular enforcement if a speed limit is set too low as this could result in an unreasonable additional demand on police resources and there are no additional resources available to support extra enforcement. Messages from partners that police will not enforce need to be discouraged. Such messaging can encourage non-compliance and should be avoided. The policy of Thames Valley Police is to use sound practical and realistic criteria (Setting local speed limits - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)) when responding to Highway Authorities in an effort to promote consistency and to reduce the burden of constant and unnecessary enforcement. composition of road users (including existing and potential levels of vulnerable road users) existing traffic speeds road environment However I recognise Oxfordshire County Council now have their own Policy for Setting Speed Limits and I expect full compliance of that policy going forward in relation to both monitoring, future engineering and self-enforcement through Community Speed Watch. Our stance remains that primarily 20 mph speed limits and zones should be self-enforcing Speed limits should be considered as part of a package of measures to manage vehicle speeds and improve road safety. Changes to the highway (for example through narrowing, providing vertical traffic calming or re-aligning the road) may be required to encourage lower speeds in addition to any change in speed limit. Though these may be more expensive, they are more likely to be successful in the long term in achieving lower speeds without the need for increased police enforcement to penalise substantial numbers of motorists. No objection – I confirm that the proposal referenced above has no impact on regular bus services. Accordingly, no objection is offered by us. (2) Head of Built It should nevertheless be noted that in the past, a regular bus service was provided between Bampton and Oxford via Environment and Infrastructure, (Go-Eynsham, before the budget for these services was withdrawn by the County Council in 2016. While we are unaware of any intent to provide a replacement service at any point in the future, it is evident that the cumulative impact of this proposal, Ahead Group) along with extensive application of 20mph limits through the other settlements, would make re-provision of any passenger transport that much more economically and practically challenging. 20mph speed limit - Object I think the speed limits are fine as they are. The money wasted could have been spent in better ways. I agree round schools and old peoples homes but not general. I hit 20mph limits in the most ridiculous places. It certainly won't make me ride a bike or walk . I will decide that myself accordingly . I feel for delivery drivers and people trying to get to work. It's all a money wasting eco pushing nonsense. As far as I know and I've been here 61 years there have been no injuries or deaths on the roads round Northmoor !! Spend the money making the roads usable for a start . It's all about control and dying to get us out of our cars! Impossible living in Northmoor we need to drive . 30mph speed limit — Object As with my previous comments before the same applies . Travel change: No

(7) Local resident, (Northmoor, Witney, Church Road)	20mph speed limit – Object I don't think it's necessary, people don't stick to 30 now so they definitely won't stick to 20. Waste of money. 30mph speed limit – Object Waste of money, including people's time and effort Travel change: No
(8) Local resident, (Witney)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph is plenty low enough for a speed limit, all that's happening is wasting money and time on a speed blanket. The money and time could be better spent repairing the roads and maintaining the verges and hedges. 30mph speed limit – Object It has always been a national speed limit and never been any issues as far as I am aware, people who live in the countryside and around farms have common sense and know what to expect on these roads. Same as the previously mentioned 20mph speed blanket, your basically reducing the traffic to a standstill all around the county by doing this and it's proven that cars constantly running at these lower speeds is producing more CO2 emissions. Travel change: No
(9) Local resident, (Northmoor, Standlake Road)	20mph speed limit – Object I believe the proposed 20 mph limit is widely disregarded being too slow for comfortable speed maintenance, and increases danger rather than decreases it by watching the speedometer rather than the road ahead. The 30 mph limit for church road Northmoor is a safe speed with no reported accidents to my knowledge. 30mph speed limit – Partially support The extension of the 30 mph limit to replace the current 40 mph in Standlake Road and Bablock Road does not extend far enough. I live on the Standlake Road a single track road that has a 60 mph limit on a significant length and with verges no

	longer cut is a danger to those who are walking or cycling along it. The 30 limit should be extended to Cow Lane corner. It is a nonsense to change from 30 to 60 for a single track road leading into Northmoor. Travel change: No
(10) Local resident, (Northmoor, Windrush Place)	20mph speed limit – Object This will make no difference at all as most vehicles are under that speed anyway. Why spend money on something that is a total waste of time and serves no purpose. 30mph speed limit – Partially support If this goes ahead it needs to be extended to the end of both roads. Alternatively cut the verges back so people can get off the road and drivers can see pedestrians. This is not a speed issue it is an observation issue. Travel change: No
(11) Local resident, (Northmoor, Chapel Lane)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph is advisory anyway and drivers should use their discretion, common sense and sensitivity as to what speed they travel at , with due care and attention to other pedestrians cyclists horses etc . Where I do object is when motorists drive like the clappers through the village, with no thought of others , and not pulling into passing places courteously . 30mph speed limit – Support This is a sensible speed if adhered to with due care and attention . Travel change: No
(12) Local resident, (Northmoor, Bablock Road)	20mph speed limit – Object 20 mph limits are too slow everywhere. It causes more congestion. 30 mph is perfectly OK. Those who need to reduce speed are the ones who take no notice of them anyway. Good drivers should not keep getting penalised by having to drive slower than bicycles.

(14) Local resident, (Northmoor, Griffiths Close)	20mph speed limit – Object 20 mph is too slow and nobody abides by the rules and parish councillors are worst offenders 30mph speed limit – Support It's a more realistic speed if people abide the rules Travel change: No
(15) Local resident, (Northmoor, Church Road)	20mph speed limit – Object Unless there are traffic issues on surrounding rounds the village is not a busy through route. I live on the section of the road which is in the current 40mph zone and I do not find there are issues with regular speeding near my home. I am a dog walker and do not feel unsafe due to speeding whilst walking on the road to my home. Most traffic is local people who slow down when they see a pedestrian or dog. I agree that cyclists and horse riders may have safety issues but that is not about speed but drivers trying to pass before they is the space to do so as the road in mainly single carriageway. I responded to the recent parish council survey to say that more passing places, drivers refraining from parking in passing places and management of vegetation on verges would significantly improve road safety far more than imposing a lower speed limit which have minimal effect.

I commute to Thame to work and it is taking longer and longer due to speed restrictions and traffic caused by rediculous anti driver policies in Oxford. You need to offer a decent alternative before you take cars off of the road. People who don't work or commute are happy to support these measures but I have to get to work to run my business. I am a keen cyclist - have you tried cycling on Oxfordshire's roads? It hurts thanks to the poor road surfaces and is dangerous because of potholes. 30mph speed limit — No objection 30mph is reasonable in villages. Travel change: No

(18) Local resident, (Bablock Hythe, Thameside)	20mph speed limit — Partially support On the lanes/roads from northmoor all the way pass Bablockhythe, the speed needs to be restricted to 30 all the way.A holiday park at Bablockhythe has a lot of walkers ,especially with the Thames footpath, plus dog walkers ,horse riders ect. The speed needs lowering ASAP, also a lot of the lane/road, is too narrow for cars to pass especially with the potholes and a road ,west end as an example, that is like a ploughed field. 30mph speed limit — No objection Needs it Travel change: No
(19) Local resident, (Northmoor, Moreton Lane)	20mph speed limit – Partially support I think 30mph is sufficient but would not object to a 20 mph speed limit if it improves safety and slows drivers speed, even if not to 20 mph. 30mph speed limit – No objection I think 30 mph is a suitable speed for these roads as there are still houses on these roads Travel change: No
(20) Local resident, (Northmoor, Church Road)	20mph speed limit – Partially support Whilst I support the reductions in speed limits I don't believe they go far enough. (22) Local resident, (Northmoor, Standlake Road)	20mph speed limit – Partially support The 30mph out of Northmoor should be extended beyond the current 30mph limit along the whole of Standlake to Cow Lane and along Moreton lane. Both these roads are narrow with high verges/hedges which is dangerous to walkers/dog walkers, especially along Standlake Road where residents from Parkfarm with children live. 30mph speed limit – Partially support Should be extended for the whole of Standlake Road up to Cowlane. Similarly this limit should be extended along Moreton lane too. The 60mph limit passing ParkFarm where children, Dogs, Walkers use the road is dangerous. There is no good reason to need to travel above 20mph for the short distance through the village, and a lower speed limit will offer greater protection to pedestrians. 30mph speed limit – Partially support I believe the exits from the village towards Bablock Hythe & Standlake should be 30mph as pedestrians are often on the road, many public footpath entrances, and the road towards the bend at Bablock Hythe is narrow and visibility on the bend, resticted. The village section should be 20mph for reasons previously stated.

(29) Local resident, (Northmoor, Park Farm Place)	20mph speed limit – Support The speed going through the village is too fast with so many children and virtually no footpaths. 30mph speed limit – Partially support I support where it is proposed but would like to see it expanded to the first residential estate within the Northmoor postcodes which is the entry at Park Farm Place. Many residents on both sides of the footpath through the sheep grazing

	pastures walk along Northmoor road to access. The road is narrow and there are no footpaths. During certain times of the year, it is virtually impossible to get onto the verge as it has a lot of stinging nettle and hedges. (31) Local resident, (Northmoor, Church Road)	20mph speed limit – Support The speed restrictions as specified do not go far enough. Moreton Lane is not covered and the limit for the single track lane with passing places is 60mph. This should be reduced to 30mph. The road coming off Cow lane past Park farm houses is still unrestricted, the speed limit in order to create better safety would be 30mph from Cow lane through the entire village to reach the current 30mph which should be reduced to 20mph through the village reaching the current 40 sign at Causeway cottage. I would also extend the 40mph limit to the W until past Park Farm. 30mph speed limit – Support Reducing the speed limit in what is currently a 40mph area makes sense to calm traffic on narrow roads. (43) Local resident, (Northmoor, Park Farm Place)	20mph speed limit – Support There are very limited footpaths in the village along a narrow road hence the safety aspect 30mph speed limit – Support It is imperative for safety concerns. It should be continued from the village to Cow Lane to allow residents at Park Farm (15+) houses mostly occupied by families to walk to the village safely. Currently it is 60mph and is highly dangerous for walkers and cyclists in the absence of a footpath. Residents at Park Farm feel isolated from the village because of this. Travel change: Yes – walk/wheel more
