Children's Trust Board Report

Executive Summary

The Children's Trust ensures that the Health and Wellbeing Board are sighted on the key challenges facing children and young people in Oxfordshire. This report provides updates from the Children's Trust Board (CTB).

Main Report

1. SEND Inspection & Oxfordshire Education Commission Report

Ofsted and CQC carried out the SEND inspection of the Oxfordshire Local Area Partnership between 13 – 21 July 2023

The ASEND inspection outcome report was published on the 15th of September 2023

Outcome

The inspectors found that "there are widespread and/or systemic failing leading to significant concerns about the experiences and outcomes of children and young people with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND), which the local area partnership must address urgently".

Response

The local area partnership must submit a "Priority Action Plan" by 27th October 2023, this being co-developed by the Oxfordshire SEND Partnership Delivery Group via a number of workshops.

The Oxfordshire SEND Strategic Improvement and Assurance Board will provide oversight and assurance.

Monitoring Inspection

Ofsted and CQC (Care Quality Commission) will carry out a monitoring inspection in 18 months' time.

The independently chaired Oxfordshire Education Commission published their report alongside the agenda for the meeting of Cabinet on 19th September 2023. The Education Commission considered how the Council, collectively with all statefunded schools, other education settings, and partners including children and families, could plan to sustain improving outcomes for all Oxfordshire children. The Commission sets out 17 proposals for the Council along with schools and other partners to consider.

A proposed response and action plan will be submitted to Cabinet for its approval.

2. The Children's Trust Board - Reflection (breakout groups, polls, and feedback)

The format of the Children's Trust Meeting was proactive and engaging with group discussions, a workshop, and polls, for members to provide input on how the Board will change going forward. The workshop focused on the contributions of the Children's Trust, the impact, and outcomes. It was an opportunity for all members to reflect on this on a personal and collective partnership level. A brief overview of the Children's Trust Board was provided for this reflection:

Primary Objectives

- To ensure that effective multi-agency working is in place at a strategic level across children's service.
- That the voice of children, young people and their families contributes to these arrangements and to decision making.

Purpose

- Oversee key areas of multi-agency strategic planning for children and young people.
- Improve outcomes for children.
- Drive the integration agenda.
- Champion the involvement of children, young people, parents, and carers.
- Ensure the Health and Wellbeing Board and other partnerships are sighted on the key challenges facing children and young people in Oxfordshire.

Governance

 CTB is held to account by the Oxfordshire Health and Wellbeing Board and must present regular report to that board as well as the Oxfordshire Safeguarding Children's Board and the Voice of Oxfordshire Youth.

Members were allocated breakout groups to discuss the following key questions:

- 1. How impactful has your membership of the CTB been to date in influencing what you do back in your organization in relation to health and wellbeing?
- 2. To what extend do you feel the voice of Children & Young People influence priorities and decisions made at the CTB? e.g., in relation to neglect, mental health and wellbeing
- 3. To what extent do you feel that voluntary, community and faith organisations are able to influence priorities and decisions made at the CTB? e.g., in relation to neglect, mental health and wellbeing

The groups discussed the CTB's potential future options to have increased impact and improve outcomes for children, young people, and their families. The above questions were also used in an anonymous poll for the members to answer, after returning from their workshop group.

1. We Icome and Intro - Anne Coyle

2. SEND Inspection & Oxfordshire Education Commission - Anne Coyle/Lynda Poole

The ASEND inspection outcome report was published on the 15th of September and the link is provided: <u>Area SEND inspection of Oxfordshire Local Area Partnership</u>

Within the slide show provided above as well as an overview of the CTB workshop, it provides the findings, the priority actions and the approach being taken to jointly develop the action plan. It was noted to all members that the local area partnership must submit a Priority Action Plan (PAP) by the 27 th of

October.

Ofsted and CQC will carry out a monitoring inspection in 18 months' time.

A suggestion was raised that it would be useful to bring in voluntary organisations to contribute to the PAP. The Board were advised that the voluntary, community, and faith sector would be able to contribute to the PAP.

There were some key messages from the Oxfordshire Education Commission report (below) which was published alongside the agenda for the meeting of Cabinet on 19th September 2023. A proposed response and action plan will be submitted to Cabinet for its approval.



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3. The Children's Trust Board - Reflection (breakout groups, polls, and feedback)

A brief overview describing the CTB role in the constitution, was provided as a reminder and for those members that are unaware, such as its primary objectives, purpose, and governance.

Members were allocated breakout groups for about 25 minutes to discuss the following key questions:

- 1. How impactful has your membership of the CTB been to date in influencing what you do back in your organization in relation to health and wellbeing?
- 2. To what extend do you feel the voice of Children & Young People influence priorities and decisions made at the CTB? e.g., in relation to neglect, mental health and wellbeing
- 3. To what extent do you feel that voluntary, community and faith organisations are able to influence priorities and decisions made at the CTB? e.g., in relation to neglect, mental health and wellbeing

Each group was to discuss what can be done to improve/change the CTB and to think about its potential future options to have increased impact and improve outcomes. A volunteer from each group provided feedback to the wider group on return to the main meeting room.

Brief overview of feedback

- Consensus was that the current CTB is not working, and we need to re-think how we go forward
- How is this going to look like going forward
- Need to involve the voice of the children and families which are more valuable from voluntary and faith organisations voices need to be heard
- Invite representatives for the voice of the child/YPs
- Making the best of inspirational people

Following the workshops, the 3 questions stated above were put into a poll for members to anonymously answer, on a scale of 1 to 10, where 1 = no impact -10 = great impact
