The Cabinet Member is RECOMMENDED to approve the recommendation to extend the Oxfordshire Domestic Abuse Service (ODAS) contract for 2 years until March 2028.

Councillors declaring interests

General duty

You must declare any disclosable pecuniary interests when the meeting reaches the item on the agenda headed 'Declarations of Interest' or as soon as it becomes apparent to you.

What is a disclosable pecuniary interest?

Disclosable pecuniary interests relate to your employment; sponsorship (i.e. payment for expenses incurred by you in carrying out your duties as a councillor or towards your election expenses); contracts; land in the Council's area; licenses for land in the Council's area; corporate tenancies; and securities. These declarations must be recorded in each councillor's Register of Interests which is publicly available on the Council's website.

Disclosable pecuniary interests that must be declared are not only those of the member her or himself but also those member's spouse, civil partner or person they are living with as husband or wife or as if they were civil partners.

Declaring an interest

Where any matter disclosed in your Register of Interests is being considered at a meeting, you must declare that you have an interest. You should also disclose the nature as well as the existence of the interest. If you have a disclosable pecuniary interest, after having declared it at the meeting you must not participate in discussion or voting on the item and must withdraw from the meeting whilst the matter is discussed.

Members' Code of Conduct and public perception

Even if you do not have a disclosable pecuniary interest in a matter, the Members' Code of Conduct says that a member 'must serve only the public interest and must never improperly confer an advantage or disadvantage on any person including yourself and that 'you must not place yourself in situations where your honesty and integrity may be questioned'.

Members Code – Other registrable interests

Where a matter arises at a meeting which directly relates to the financial interest or wellbeing of one of your other registerable interests then you must declare an interest. You must not participate in discussion or voting on the item and you must withdraw from the meeting whilst the matter is discussed.

Wellbeing can be described as a condition of contentedness, healthiness and happiness; anything that could be said to affect a person's quality of life, either positively or negatively, is likely to affect their wellbeing.

Other registrable interests include:

a) Any unpaid directorships

- b) Any body of which you are a member or are in a position of general control or management and to which you are nominated or appointed by your authority.
- c) Any body (i) exercising functions of a public nature (ii) directed to charitable purposes or (iii) one of whose principal purposes includes the influence of public opinion or policy (including any political party or trade union) of which you are a member or in a position of general control or management.

Members Code – Non-registrable interests

Where a matter arises at a meeting which directly relates to your financial interest or wellbeing (and does not fall under disclosable pecuniary interests), or the financial interest or wellbeing of a relative or close associate, you must declare the interest.

Where a matter arises at a meeting which affects your own financial interest or wellbeing, a financial interest or wellbeing of a relative or close associate or a financial interest or wellbeing of a body included under other registrable interests, then you must declare the interest.

In order to determine whether you can remain in the meeting after disclosing your interest the following test should be applied:

Where a matter affects the financial interest or well-being:

- a) to a greater extent than it affects the financial interests of the majority of inhabitants of the ward affected by the decision and;
- b) a reasonable member of the public knowing all the facts would believe that it would affect your view of the wider public interest.

You may speak on the matter only if members of the public are also allowed to speak at the meeting. Otherwise you must not take part in any discussion or vote on the matter and must not remain in the room unless you have been granted a dispensation.

DETOXIFICATION AND RESIDENTIAL REHABILITATION SERVICES FOR ADULTS WITH PROBLEMATIC SUBSTANCE USE – DYNAMIC APPROVED PROVIDER LIST (DAPL)

Recommendation

The Cabinet Member is RECOMMENDED to:

a) Approve the contract extensions for the Detoxification and Residential Rehabilitation Services for Adults with Problematic Substance Use-Dynamic Approved Provider List (DAPL), provided by the providers appointed onto the DAPL, for a period of 2 years as allowed for in the original contracts.

Executive Summary

- Detoxification and Residential Rehabilitation Services for Adults with Problematic Substance Use, are provided by 17 providers across the United Kingdom. Each provider has passed the Council's governance and insurance criteria via a procurement in 2021, to be awarded a DAPL contract to provide these services for Oxfordshire residents.
- 2. The current four-year contract ends on 30 April 2026. A decision on enacting the extension option in the contract must be made before 31 January 2026. The recommended two-year extension period would commence on 01 May 2026 until 30 April 2028.
- 3. Funding for these placements comes from Public Heath (PH) and a small contribution from external grants. The contract value across all 17 providers is anticipated to be circa £1,013,000 per annum in total.

Background

- 4. The aim of residential detoxification and rehabilitation services is to provide comprehensive clinical detoxification treatment and/or rehabilitation for highly vulnerable people with complex substance use issues who are unable to achieve abstinence in the community, due to complex physical or mental health needs, entrenched behaviours or complexities in their social circumstances.
- 5. Placements made under the DAPL are funded by the Public Health Grant, a small allocation from external grants, Rough Sleeping Drug and Alcohol

- Treatment Grant (RSDATG), the Supplementary Substance Use Treatment and Recovery Grant (SSMTRG), and Adult Social Care (ASC).
- 6. Our community alcohol and drug treatment service supports many individuals, but those with complex health issues or challenging social circumstances may require residential treatment to prevent harm.

Service delivery

- 7. Residential detoxification provides medical support for safe withdrawal from substances, while rehabilitation focuses on addressing underlying issues and developing strategies for long-term recovery through counselling, education, and support. Placements are usually between 2-4 weeks for detoxification and 12 weeks for rehabilitation.
- 8. The DAPL comprises 17 providers which offer different styles of detoxification/rehabilitation programmes in a range of geographical locations predominately outside of Oxfordshire. This allows for the placement of people on a basis that supports individual needs and preferences, increasing the likelihood of successful completion.
- 9. Public Health implements a comprehensive monitoring and quality assurance framework, including on-site provider visits, to ensure that all services for this complex group are delivered to contractual standards and are registered with and overseen by the relevant national care quality bodies in England, Wales, or Scotland.

Benefits of Extension

- 10. Extending the contract ensures continuity of service for community alcohol and drug services, maintains high-quality service delivery, avoids disruption for people accessing residential treatment, and supports the Council's strategic aims of protecting vulnerable residents and improving health outcomes.
- 11. Prices for placements are fixed under the DAPL. Extending the contract is the most cost-effective option for the Council as it fixes pricing at the 2025-2026 level with any uplifts being at the discretion of the Council.

Business need

12. The Council is responsible for providing residential services as part of an effective alcohol and drug treatment system, and in line with the OHID Drug and Alcohol Treatment and Recovery Improvement Grant, is expected to send at least 2% of the treatment population to residential rehabilitation treatment.

Strategic Alignment

- Provision of an alcohol and drug service, and DAPL services are aligned with 13. the Oxfordshire County Council Strategic Plan 2023-2025¹ by tackling inequalities in Oxfordshire and prioritising the health and wellbeing of residents, as well as the Oxfordshire Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2024-2030² by reducing the impact of ill-health through provision of alcohol advice and treatment.
- Extending the DAPL contract enables delivery of enhanced substance use 14. support to vulnerable populations, in line with the 10-year national alcohol and drug strategy 'From Harm to Hope', and meets local strategic priorities overseen by the Oxfordshire Combating Drugs Partnership of reducing drug and alcohol related deaths and increasing the number of people in effective treatment and becoming drug free.

Financial Implications

- 15. The extension term recommended is 24 months. At the current funding level, the total value of the extension would be circa £2,026,000 for the full 24months.
- 16. This would be expected to be funded as previously done by the Public Health Funds and externals grants as outlined in the Background section - point 7 if they are confirmed beyond 2025-26. Additional funding, if needed, will come from Public Health underspends in-year.

Legal Implications

- 17. The Council has the statutory power to undertake the substance use services delivered by this contract under section 12 of the Health and Social Care Act 2012.
- 18. The Council has the right within the DAPL contracts to extend the term for up to 24 months upon 3 months' written notice upon the same terms and conditions and has the right to terminate the DAPL contracts at any time upon 6 months' written notice.

19. The Live Well Improve and Enable Substance Use Team within the Public Health and Community Safety Directorate will continue to performance manage the contract.

Equality & Inclusion Implications

- 20. Issues with substance use are not equally distributed within the population. Strong links exist between deprivation, adverse childhood experiences and substance use, with increased risk of poor outcomes borne by vulnerable populations such as people who are homeless, sex-workers and those in contact with the criminal justice system. This service addresses the wider determinants of health, identified in regular needs assessments, by targeting services and aiming to ensure equality of access. They provide non-judgmental and accessible psychosocial and clinical services across Oxfordshire, engaging vulnerable groups and those not currently accessing services through targeted assertive outreach and engagement activities to ensure improved outcomes for these populations.
- 21. An Equalities Impact Assessment for the service was completed in July 2025.
- 22. A Climate Impact Assessment Summary was completed in July 2025; a full Climate Impact Assessment is not required for this service.

Oxfordshire Domestic Abuse Service (ODAS) Contract Extension

Report by the Director of Public Health and Communities

RECOMMENDATION

The Cabinet Member is RECOMMENDED to:

a) Approve the recommendation to extend the Oxfordshire Domestic Abuse Service (ODAS) contract for 2 years until March 2028.

Executive Summary

- 1. The ODAS contract commencing in April 2023 has been instrumental in providing critical safe accommodation support to victims of domestic abuse, fulfilling the statutory reuirements of the Domestic Abuse Act 2021. The current contract is due to end in March 2026. The service has consistently achieved its key performance indicators (KPIs), demonstrating its effectiveness and impact. There is opportunity to extend the contract by up to two years.
- 2. The cabinet member is recommended to agree to extending the ODAS contract for an additional two years, until March 2028. This extension will ensure the continued provision of essential services to those in need in Oxfordshire, ensuring access to the nesessary resources to escape abusive situations and build a safer future.

Background

- The Domestic Abuse Act 2021 requires local authorities in England to ensure provision of safe accommodation and tailored support for victim-survivors of domestic abuse, including children. This includes assessing needs and developing inclusive, effective strategies.
- 4. In response, ODAS was commissioned and jointly funded by Oxfordshire County Council and each District Council in Oxfordshire in 2023. Delivered by A2Dominion, it supports the Council in meeting its legal duties by providing inclusive, accessible, trauma-informed support to help victim-survivors escape abuse and rebuild their lives.

- 5. The service submits annual reports to the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) to evidence local provision, and the services performance is monitored through regular contract monitoring.
- 6. Established on the 2024 Crime Survey, an estimated 29,553 people in Oxfordshire experience domestic abuse in 2023. ODAS addresses this through provision of:
 - a. Emergency refuge and dispersed housing
 - b. Outreach and helpline services
 - c. Specialist support for children and young people
 - d. Services for marginalise groups, including sex workers and those with insecure immigration status
- 7. The ODAS is fundamental to delivery of the Oxfordshire Domestic Abuse Safe Accommodation Strategy 2025-2028, ensuring a coordinated, responsive approach.

Key issues

- 8. Compliance with statutory duties: There is a need to extend the ODAS contract to comply with the Councils duties to provide safe accommodation to victim-survivors of domestic abuse under the Domestic Abuse Act 2021. This act mandates local services to ensure victim-survivors can remain safe in their own homes or access alternative safe accommodation and specialist support.
- Financial Partnering Agreement: Each District council has agreed to continue financial contributions for the contract extension duration ensuring all parties are committed to continuing their financial support for the services provided under the contract.
- 10. Domestic Abuse Grant: The Domestic Abuse grant is now provided within the core Council settlement annually. This financial stability is crucial for the continued services provided to victim-survivors.
- 11. Alignment with Strategies: Extending the ODAS service underpins the current Oxfordshire domestic abuse safe accommodation strategy 2025-2028 recommendations. The overarching Oxfordshire domestic abuse strategy and health needs assessment are being reviewed and updated in 2025. This provides an opportunity to add amendments to the existing ODAS contract or create additional contracts if necessary to meet the needs of the population.

Corporate Policies and Priorities

12. The recommendation to extend the ODAS contract fit within the Council's strategic direction, values and principles as outlined in "Thriving Communities for Everyone in Oxfordshire." This includes a vision to help people live healthy lives and provide access to services that can enhance the quality of life in our communities.

- 13. Vision: The recommended contract extension supports the vision of a thriving, sustainable, and inclusive community by ensuring victim-survivors have access to safe accommodation, enhancing their quality of life.
- 14. Values: The recommended contract extension embodies the values of integrity, accountability, and collaboration by addressing statutory responsibilities to support victim-survivors of domestic abuse in Oxfordshire.
- 15. Objectives: The recommended contract extension contributes to improving public health, social welfare, and community safety by providing a secure environment for victim-survivors to recover and rebuild their lives and reduce immediate threats to safety.
- 16. Strategic Priorities: The recommended contract extension aligns with priorities of sustainability, innovation, and inclusivity by proposing sustainable temporary housing solutions to domestic abuse and ensuring support for the most vulnerable community members.

Financial Implications

- 17. The cost of the recommended 2-year contract extension will continue to be funded jointly by the Council and each District Council in Oxfordshire.
- 18. The Councils contribution is £610,382 per annum. MHCLG Domestic Abuse grant funding will be used to deliver the Councils financial contribution.

Procurement Implications

- 19. The ODAS contract has the unilateral right for the Council to extend the agreement on the same terms and conditions, on a minimum of 6 months written notice. As the extension is built into the existing contract terms, there is no need to modify the agreement to enact the extension, provided the notice requirement is met.
- 20. Therefore, there are no procurement implications associated with extending this contract.

Legal Implications

- 21. Under the Domestic Abuse Act 2021 the council is required to provide safe accommodation and tailored support for victim-survivors of domestic abuse, including children. This includes assessing needs and developing inclusive, effective strategies.
- 22. The existing contract for ODAS was procured under the Public Contracts Regulations 2015 (PCR) and any modifications to the contract are regulated by the PCR. The option to extend was clearly and unequivocally provided for in the procurement documents and it is therefore permissible for the council to extend the contract for up to 2 years.
