Aim or Focus	Each year the County Council undertakes an Annual Review of prices paid to its contracted care providers, and considers the same alongside the above requirements. In doing so the Council is expected to
	 assess the actual cost of care in its local area consider the views of providers regarding the same consider local market factors carry out an Equality Impact Assessment as part of the decision-making process.
Deliverable	The Better Care Fund JMG was asked to review outcome of the Annual Review of prices and agree the use of £1.3m for provider uplifts available through the council's budget for 2020/21.

2. Update on Reablement Service

Priority	Being Physically & Emotionally Healthy
Aim or Focus	For some time, Oxfordshire has not met the reablement targets that we have set for ourselves, and a report was presented outlining the work underway involving OCC, OCCG, OUH and OH to look at national reablement models and pathways.
	There is significant variance in national models, which are best understand in the context of their local systems, and it is difficult to select a 'lift and shift' model that could work in Oxfordshire. Local geography, the commissioning and provider landscape, and other services available all influence the success of reablement models elsewhere.
Deliverable	In addition, the work underway to review changes to be implemented in the short term were reviewed, with ongoing oversight of these to be via the Urgent Care Working Group.
Progress report	The proposals were agreed and further updates requested
