Development of LCWIPs is a policy requirement within Oxfordshire's Local Transport and Connectivity Plan. LCWIPs play a key role in supporting more journeys by walking and cycling and addressing the climate emergency. No negative equalities impacts have been identified as arising from the Witney LCWIP, instead there is significant opportunity to address inequality in Witney and the surrounding area. The LCIWP promotes investment in infrastructure that will improve the accessibility of travel in Witney and the surrounding area for everyone. All individual highways schemes may result in unintended negative equalities impacts. This risk will be considered in detail on a scheme-by-scheme basis (using scheme-specific EIAs as appropriate) when the individual schemes promoted in the LCWIP are developed.

The Witney LCWIP is a 10-year plan for improving cycling and walking infrastructure in Witney. The improvements aim to enable walking and cycling to be the natural choices for travelling short distances (or as part of longer journeys), in Witney and the surrounding area, thereby reducing reliance on motor vehicles. It is a policy requirement in Oxfordshire County Council's Local Transport and Connectivity Plan to produce LCWIPs (Policy 3a). This is the first version of the Witney LCWIP to be considered for approval.

The LCWIP proposes: •new and improved crossings for people walking and cycling •segregated cycle tracks •provision of lighting on footpaths and cycleways •removal or modification of barriers on walking and cycling routes to improve accessibility •implementation of additional cycle parking •new and improved bridges on walking and cycling routes •footway widening and resurfacing •new shared use footway/cycleway •public realm improvements to create a more accessible and pleasant environment on High Street for people to walk, cycle and spend time.
