ALVESCOT: PROPOSED 20MPH & 30MPH SPEED LIMITS

Report by Corporate Director, Environment and Place

RECOMMENDATION

1. The Cabinet Member for Transport Management is RECOMMENDED to approve the introduction of 20mph and 30mph speed limits in Alvescot as advertised.

Executive summary

 The report presents responses to a statutory consultation on the proposed introduction of 20mph and 30mph speed limits in Alvescot as shown in Annex 1.

Financial Implications

3. Funding for consultation and the proposals themselves has been provided by the County Council's 20mph Speed Limit Project.

Equality and Inclusion Implications

4. No implications in respect of equalities or inclusion have been identified in respect of the proposals.

Sustainability Implications

5. The proposals would help encourage walking and cycling within Alvescot by making them safer and more attractive.

Formal consultation

6. Formal consultation was carried out between 06 September and 06 October 2023. A notice was published in the Witney & West Oxfordshire Gazette newspaper, and an email sent to statutory consultees & key-stakeholders, including Thames Valley Police, the Fire & Rescue Service, Ambulance service, Bus operators, countywide transport, access & disabled peoples user groups,

West Oxfordshire District Council, the local District Cllrs, Alvescot parish council, and the local County Councillor representing the Carterton South & West division.

Statutory Consultee Responses:

7. Thames Valley Police re-iterated views concerning OCC's policy and practice regarding 20mph speed limits which they consider as 'concerns' rather than an objection. Alvescot Parish Council support a resident's request for what they suggest is the proposed 40mph limit to the north of the village to be extended to the B4477 junction. The buffer limit is in fact proposed to be at 30mph. The local member responsible for the Carterton South & West division submitted their support for the proposals based on their safety-driven nature.

Other Responses:

8. 94 responses (including one from a group/organisation) were received via the online survey during the course of the formal consultation, and these are summarised in the tables below:

- 9. The respondent submitting their views as part of a group/organisation was supportive of both sets of proposals.
- 10. Many respondents expressed general concerns rather than commenting on the proposals and many repeated statements in both responses. Many comments did not align with their stated category response and some of those who stated no opinion then went on to provide one; consequently several statements of concern or no opinion should more properly be regarded as support. Objectors' views, in the case of both proposals, were more definitive and focussed on lower limits being unnecessary or ineffective. Notably several local residents suggested a short section of 20mph limit near the school would be more effective than a 20 limit over the whole village.

11. Those who responded online were also asked whether if the 20mph speed limit proposals were implemented, would it likely influence a change to their mode of travel in the area, the results of which are shown below:


12. The consultation responses are shown in **Annex 2**, and copies of the original responses are available for inspection by County Councillors.

Officer response to objections/concerns

- 13. The main purpose of the scheme is to improve road safety and to encourage greater use of active travel by reducing speeds; this will also reduce collisions. The aim of reducing speed limits is to change driver's mindsets to make speeding socially unacceptable and make more environmentally friendly modes of travel such as walking and cycling more attractive and also reduce the County's carbon footprint. This forms part of a countywide programme of works that seeks to deliver 'a safer place with a safer pace'.
- 14. Despite the difficulties in defining many views, responses confirm clear overall support for the proposals. However, it should be noted that a smaller but not insignificant number of local residents objected on the grounds lower limits were unnecessary and would not be effective.
- 15. Officers cannot support the Parish Council's request that a 30mph or 40mph limit be implemented up to the B4477 junction as the area is largely rural in character and has no significant accident history.

RESPONDENT	COMMENTS
(1) Traffic Management Officer, (Thames Valley Police)	 Concerns – Thames Valley Police welcome the opportunity to engage on plans for road safety improvement and acknowledge that 20mph limits can be a useful tool in road safety. There are other reasons 20mph limits may be desirable for communities, such as environmental concerns, and creating a shared space environment to encourage greater diversity of road users. Compliance with 20mph limits is a challenging issue as there is a difference between the achievable results of the various available schemes. For example a sign-only scheme will only have a limited effect on the mean speeds, as opposed to other schemes that influence the road environment, which is recognised as being key to achieving compliance. If a speed limit is set too low and is ignored then this could result in the vulnerable road user being less safe. It can also cause a dis-proportionate number of drivers to criminalise themselves and could bring the system of speed limits into disrepute.
	Thames Valley Police have no policy to enforce based on arbitrary speed limits alone but will enforce based on threat of harm, risk and resourcing. 20mph limits are not excluded from this and will be enforced where appropriate. There should be no expectation that the police would be able to provide regular enforcement if a speed limit is set too low as this could result in an unreasonable additional demand on police resources and there are no additional resources available to support extra enforcement. Messages from partners that police will not enforce need to be discouraged. Such messaging can encourage non-compliance and should be avoided. The policy of Thames Valley Police is to use sound practical and realistic criteria (Setting local speed limits - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)) when responding to Highway Authorities in an effort to promote consistency and to reduce the burden of constant and unnecessary enforcement. The advice shown in Circular Roads 1/2013 states.
	 The key factors that should be taken into account in any decisions on local speed limits are: history of collisions road geometry and engineering road function composition of road users (including existing and potential levels of vulnerable road users) existing traffic speeds

road environment
However I recognise Oxfordshire County Council now have their own Policy for Setting Speed Limits and I expect full compliance of that policy going forward in relation to both monitoring , future engineering and self-enforcement through Community Speed Watch.
Our stance remains that primarily 20 mph speed limits and zones should be self-enforcing
Speed limits should be considered as part of a package of measures to manage vehicle speeds and improve road safety. Changes to the highway (for example through narrowing, providing vertical traffic calming or re-aligning the road) may be required to encourage lower speeds in addition to any change in speed limit. Though these may be more expensive, they are more likely to be successful in the long term in achieving lower speeds without the need for increased police enforcement to penalise substantial numbers of motorists.
Support/Concerns – At the Alvescot Parish Council meeting on 20th of September attended by County Cllr N Leverton, a local resident again raised their concerns about the dangers of exiting and entering their property on the B4020 and especially when walking their children to school in the absence of a footpath. They have requested that the new proposed 40mph limit on the B4020 be extended to the junction with the B4477. Attached is an exchange of emails that I had with Geoff Barrell on this subject earlier this year. The Alvescot Parish Council agree that this is an extremely dangerous stretch of road and that the request is fully justified on grounds of safety.
Support – I am happy to support this safety driven initiative for Alvescot. Thank you for being so proactive will their application.
20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Concerns I have no problem with some additional safety measures/markings around the school but 20 mph speed limits are more damaging to the environment, are poorly tolerated and genuinely do not save lives. There are studies out there to show all of these facts but they are little talked about. Travel change: No

(5) Local resident, (Alvescot, Station Road)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – No opinion 20mph limits elsewhere are proving to cause dangerous situations where cars are trying to overtake those (few) who are actually following the 20mph speed limit and causing potential accidents. Most other people simply ignore the speed limit anyway Travel change: I have no choice but to drive as I live here and commute to work, etc so this question is irrelevant
(6) Local resident, (Carterton, Home Close)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – No opinion 20mph is too slow and actually dangerous outside of built up residential areas. My experience is it leads to to far more incidents of road rage and overtaking. I have seen many of these incidents in Witney on Curbridge road whereas in 35+ years of driving I have never seen a single car overtaken at 30. The argument that less people are injured at 20 than 30 is fatuous. Even less injured at 10, even less at 5, none at zero - just ban cars. Enforce the 30 mph properly and stop going ahead with limits that the majority of the public disagree with and indeed ignore. Travel change: No
(7) Local resident, (Alvescot, Lower End)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Object These 20 mph zones are unnecessary and Draconian. Travel change: No

(8) Local resident, (Alvescot, Main Road)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Object Having longer stretches to 20mph than by the school will mean people will lose concentration and not go the speed limit as will not pay attention when it's needed Travel change: No
(9) Local resident, (Alvescot, Main Road)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Object Reduced speed limits are only of benefit when they are used in specific areas/zones. Motorists do not pay attention to reduced speed limits if they are not targeted. Covering an entire village in 20mph has no benefit. I would support a short section of 20mph in the area of the school, village park and bus stops. This could be from the junction for Lower End to the Plough pub. Only having 20mph in this zone highlights the need for a driver to respect the limit. Speed in the village has become worse since the traffic calming measures were added on entry to either end of the village. Travel change: No
(10) Member of public, (Alvescot, Oakley Close)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Object Pointless. Travel change: No
(11) Local resident, (Alvescot, Station Road)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Object the existing 30MPH limit is ok as long as this is policed all 20mph limits on through routes should not have been implemented

(16) Local resident, (Alvescot, Lower End)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Support I haven't seen any evidence in support of the proposals. Travel change: No
(17) Local resident, (Alvescot, Main Road)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Support 20mph for Alvescot = Unfortunatley 20mph speed limits are not effective when deployed in a blanket fashion over entire areas. Drivers do not respect these and see them only as an inconvenience. The lack of any Police presence to monitor speed limits allows this to happen. This can be seen easily by visiting other local villages such as Kencot, Bampton or Aston, and larger towns such as Witney (all areas where the 20mph limits are blanket and generally unpopular with residents). 20mph limits are effective when targeted at specific areas where they are of benefit and where drivers can understand and appreciate the benefit. A 20mph limit will increase the dwell time of traffic passing properties, which is not attractive. A 20mph limit will make it very difficult to join the B4020 from a property driveway as there will be a constant stream of traffic. The main problem with speed in the village relates to the area by the school where measures clearly should be taken - a targeted approach. A 20mph limit could be imposed on the B4020 between the Plough pub and the junction with The Green towards Lower End. Additionally a safe crossing point for the children at pick up/drop off and during their school day for access to the playing field will be beneficial. A traditional lolly pop person may also be helpful as drivers will respect this. Existing traffic claming in the village has failed and has only increased the speed of traffic. 30mph on B4020 - replacing the existing 40mph section between Alvescot and Black Bourton with 30mph may be succesful and generally help reduce the speed through Alvescot. Travel change: No
(18) Local resident, (Alvescot, Pemscot Close)	20mph speed limit – Object 30mph speed limit – Support Already have traffic calming! No need for more

The traffic calming measure will likely have similar effect as that encountered at existing same measures found at entrance to village (from Carterton end) and that found in Bampton (from A420 end), namely that it creates a hazard; drivers often failing to give correct right of way, or speeding up/taking risks to squeeze through before the oncoming car gets there. PS: the quality of tarmac surfacing after the last traffic calming initiative was installed in Alvescot is a disgrace and painful for cyclists and motorcyclists to travel over. Travel change: No
(21) Local resident, (Alvescot, Main Road)	20mph speed limit – Concerns 30mph speed limit – Concerns I don't think drivers will keep to the limit. Better to have more speed checks. Travel change: No

(22) Local resident, (Alvescot)	20mph speed limit – Concerns 30mph speed limit – No opinion the reasons given that reducing speed limit to 20 mph would encourage people to walk or cycle are moot given the distance from alvescot to nearest facilities, the lack of pavements to enable walking and the fact that the majority of the roads on to which cyclists would then enter are national speed limit, so enhanced safety would likely be for a tiny proportion of their journey. The ecological impacts of 20mph also need to be factored in given the likely higher emissions associated with motor vehicles operating less efficiently at these speeds. More cyclists would be more likely if the conditions of road surfaces were adequately maintained rather than by implementing arbitrary 20mph speed limits across the whole village. Similarly, if reducing vehicular traffic is a driver, using the money to improve provision of public transport to provide alternative means of transport would be of greater value Travel change: No
(23) Local resident, (Alvescot, Lower End)	20mph speed limit – Concerns 30mph speed limit – No opinion Enforcement concerns and poorly considered sign placement, particularly at the south end of the village where signs B8 and B9 would negatively impact the village aesthetic, and would never realistically be enforced. It is also near impossible to achieve speeds in excess of 20mph down Lower End due to the road layout, narrowing points and parked vehicles. Travel change: No
